Painting to be on auction at Legion conference in St. Cloud

Local artist, Carole Euerle (Shevlin) donated this stunning Red Poppy Watercolor to the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 16, for the Silent Auction to be held during the Minnesota American Legion Fall Conference in St. Cloud, MN. October 27th and 28th!

Carole's artwork has been donated to the American Legion Fall Conference in the past. One of her "Eagle" paintings hangs in the hallway of the Eagles Healing Nest in Sauk Centre, MN. It was won by a "Gold Star" mom who lost her son to suicide while he was on active duty in Alaska. During a session of the conference the mother told of her harrowing story; from the terrible news of her sons death, to the near impossible task of getting her sons body returned to Minnesota during the Covid pandemic.

Death by suicide in the armed services is at an all-time high since record keeping began since 9/11. According to an article (USO Sept 2023), some branches of our armed forces are experiencing the highest rate of suicide since WWII.

Since 9/11, 30,177 active duty personnel and veterans who served after 9/11 have died by suicide, 4x higher than deaths that occurred during military operations. These numbers only reflect the deaths by suicide that have been confirmed.

The Eagles Healing Nest (EHN) is a non-profit organization committed to providing needed services and programs for our veterans, service members, and their families who suffer from the effects of trauma and the invisible wounds of war, including PTSD, anxiety, and addiction.

The "Poppy" is a sacred symbol for many of the armed services around the world, and has been since WWI. It symbolizes the sacrifice made by our veterans, service members and their families. In a poem by Lt Col. John McCrae, "In Flanders Fields", May 1915, tells about how the Red Poppy came to be



so symbolic!

National Poppy Day is "always" the Friday before Memorial Day. In 2024, it will be May 24th. You will be able to get a poppy at both Bagley grocery stores, and other area businesses. Donations for the poppy's go to three very specific veteran programs.

Immunizations will be offered beginning Monday, Oct. 16, at the following locations:

- Essentia Health-Fosston Clinic | 900 Hilligoss Blvd. SE.

- Essentia Health-Bagley Clinic | 121 Central St. W.
- Essentia Health-Oklee Clinic | 400 Governor St.

Fosston will have walk-in hours for immunizations every weekday from 3-5 p.m. through Thursday, Nov. 16.

Immunizations will be available in Bagley every weekday

during clinic hours through Friday, Nov. 17. An appointment is recommended; please call (218) 694-6281.

Immunizations will be available in Oklee every Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday during clinic hours through Friday, Nov. 17. An appointment is recommended; please call (218)

796-4525.

The following vaccines will be available: influenza, COVID-19, tetanus, pertussis, chicken pox, polio, measles/mumps/rubella, haemophilus, rotavirus, hepatitis A and B, pneumonia, meningitis (both strains), Gardasil and shingles.

Patients can schedule their flu shot in advance by calling (844) 663-1068, online through EssentiaHealth.org/Flu or through the Essentia MyChart patient portal. Flu vaccines are recommended for anyone 6 months of age and older and are covered by Medicare, Medicaid and most private insurance.

Attendees should bring their insurance card. You do not have to be a patient of Essentia to attend.

Polk County Sheriff

Crash Fatality

On 10/13/2023 at approximately 0220 hours, the Polk County Sheriff's Office and Crookston Police Department responded to a report of a crash near the intersection of Houston Avenue and South Broadway in the City of Crookston. A witness reported that a vehicle had left the roadway near the north end of the Red Lake River bridge and had entered the river.

Deputies and officers responded and located damage consistent with the report.

Grand Forks County Dive Team personnel are on scene and assisting with attempts to locate a vehicle in the river. Vehicle and occupant information are currently unknown.

The driver and sole occupant of the vehicle that entered the river has been identified as William Mark Tuset (26) of Crookston. An autopsy is being performed; no foul play is suspected. The vehicle recovered from the river is a 2010 Chevy Impala. The MN State Patrol is assisting with the crash. This investigation remains active and no further information is being released at this time.

Crookston Fire Department and Crookston Area Ambulance also responded.

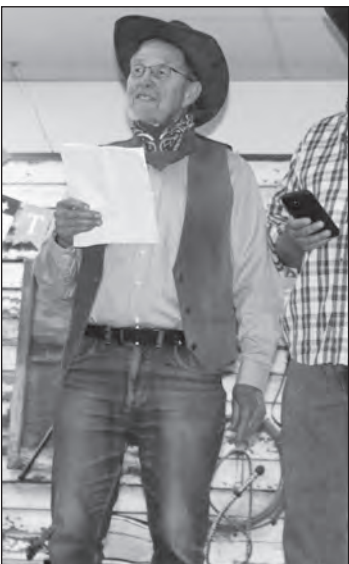

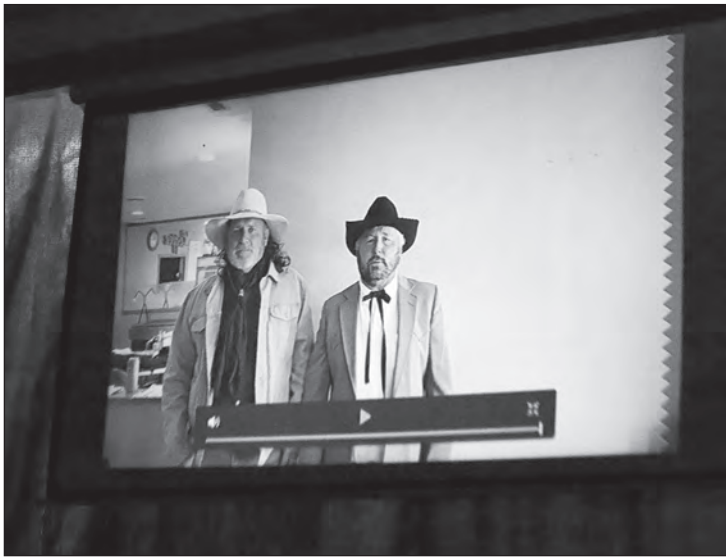

Plowing is Fun!

Fall is always a busy, busy time of year on the farm. Harvesting, maybe finishing up haying, chopping corn, and of course tillage work. My favorite is sometimes a lost art, moldboard plowing. Modern farming has went with the advantages of the chisel plow. But, as for me, take out the plow!

Of course I probably had the months of August and September to get a little plowing project done but I sort of had to hold off until now. You see I don't know if the plow would have went in the ground. But, now after a little rain in the past weeks I decided it was time. I hooked the 4640 to my 4-16" John Deere plow and headed out. I got my little project done and it made me remember how much I like to plow.

A couple of falls ago I had the chance to do a little plowing with the Tri River Pioneers west of Plummer. There were a wide variety of tractors, an 8450 John Deere with 6 bottoms, a 4450 John Deere with 5 bottoms, a GVI Minneapolis Moline with 5 bottoms, 33 Massey Harris with 3 bottoms, an A John Deere with 2 bottoms. I was driving the 33 Massey that belongs to the Tri River Pioneers museum. I hooked onto a 3 bottom International plow that was also at the museum and in just half a round the bottoms were scoured clean! I hope maybe the Pioneers can do it again this year!

I think the reason I like plowing so much is the change of the landscape behind you! For example plowing an alfalfa field or a hay meadow of some sorts, the green grass turns over so gently and the field is now turned black. I few years ago the World Plowing compe-

tion was held near Baudette, MN. I don't think I would be able to qualify for that. You see they judge on straightness and even depths and so on...I don't usually have too straight of a furrow, and maybe the hydraulic settles a bit so it is deeper in some spots than other. Never-the-less-I love to plow! Fall is moving fast and time is slipping away, but I think I have time, there is a little plowing in my future!

Ask a Trooper

Q u e s -
t i o n : I noticed several freshly killed deer

on the side of the highway yesterday. What are the traffic related requirements when someone collides with a deer, and what are the game related requirements with killing a deer? Is it legal to take the deer home?

Answer: If you are involved in a vehicle vs. deer/large animal crash, call 911 to report if there are occupant injuries, your vehicle is disabled, your vehicle or the animal is in the lane of traffic or if the animal has been injured and is unable to run away. Law enforcement will be dispatched to your location to assist. It is important to stay in your vehicle so you do not put yourself in danger of getting struck by a passing vehicle.

The Minnesota State Patrol issues permits for road-kill deer generally at the time of the crash or soon after. Any

Minnesota resident may claim a road-killed animal by contacting a law enforcement officer. An authorization permit can be issued, allowing the individual to lawfully possess the animal.

Here are some tips to avoid deer crashes:

- Drive at safe speeds.
- Be especially cautious from 6 to 9 p.m., when deer are most active.

- Use high beams when possible at night, especially in deer-active areas.

- Do not swerve to avoid a deer. Swerving can cause motorists to lose control and travel off the road or into oncoming traffic.

- Watch for the reflection of eyes and silhouettes on the shoulder of the road. If anything looks suspicious, slow down.

- Reduce speeds in areas known to have a large deer population — such as areas where roads divide agricultural fields from forest land and whenever in forested areas between dusk and dawn.

- Deer are unpredictable — they may stop in the middle of the road and change direction when crossing or move toward an approaching vehicle. Blow horn to urge deer to leave the road.

- If a deer is struck but not killed, keep your distance as deer may recover and move on.
- Avoid all distractions while driving.

You can avoid a ticket — and a crash — if you simply buckle up, drive at safe speeds, pay attention and always drive sober. Help us drive Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths.

Philippians 1:6 offers an anchor when the tide rises. "For I am confident of this very thing, that He who began a good work in you will perfect it until the day of Christ Jesus."

Another version of the same verse puts it this way. "And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ."

And yet another: "There has never been the slightest doubt in my mind that the God who started this great work in you would keep at it and bring it to a flourishing finish on the very day Christ Jesus appears."

Enjoy the process. In Him our hope. Amen.

RLC falls to ABW

The battle of the 5-1 teams came to Oklee on Friday the 13th. Both teams were looking to secure the 2-seed in the upcoming play-offs.

The defense would shine for both of the teams early. The Cougars and the Rebels would move the ball a little, only to be stopped by the aggressive defenses.

RLC would find trouble later in the 1st quarter, a bad punt snap would give ABW the ball deep in Rebel territory. The Cougars would make RLC pay

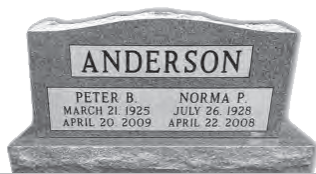

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Statewide youth deer season returns October 19-22

Minnesota's youth deer season will take place statewide Thursday, Oct. 19, through Sunday, Oct. 22. The season coincides with statewide teacher workshops, so many Minnesota students will be out of school during the youth season.

To participate, youth must be 10-17 years old and have a regular deer license. Youth ages 10 to 13 must be accompanied by an adult parent, guardian or mentor 18 or older; accompanying adults do not need to be licensed. Youth may not tag antlerless deer or legal bucks taken by another individual. Crossbows are allowed for use by youth during this season.

All hunters and mentors, regardless of whether they are participating in youth deer season, must follow blaze orange/pink clothing requirements. Fabric or synthetic ground blinds on public land must have a blaze orange safety covering on top of the blind that is visible from all directions, or a patch made of blaze orange that is at least 144 square inches (12x12 inches) on each side of the blind.

Adults may not hunt, unless they are in an area open during the early antlerless season and have the corresponding license. Complete youth season details are available on the Minnesota Department of Natural Resource youth deer season webpage (mndnr.gov/hunting/deer/youth.html).

Emerald Ash Borer Found in Cass County

Emergency quarantine on wood movement put in place for a portion of Cass County

St. Paul, MN: The Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA) has confirmed emerald ash borer (EAB) in Cass County for the first time. There are now 45 counties in the state, including Cass, with EAB.

An MDA employee noticed a cluster of ash trees near Remer with suspected signs of EAB. The employee was able to find EAB larvae and collect samples. Federal identification confirmed emerald ash borer.

EAB was first discovered in Minnesota in 2009. The insect larvae kill ash trees by tunneling under the bark and feeding on the part of the tree that moves nutrients up and down the trunk. Often, the trees show several signs of infestation because of this. Woodpeckers like to feed on EAB larvae, and woodpecker holes may indicate

the presence of emerald ash borer. Also, EAB tunneling can cause the bark to split open, revealing characteristic S-shaped galleries underneath.

Because this is the first time EAB has been identified in Cass County, the MDA is enacting an emergency quarantine for an eastern portion of the county, which limits the movement of firewood and ash material out of the area. The south and east side of the quarantine is the county border. The northern edge of the quarantine follows Minnesota Highway 200 west to County Road 129, County Road 129 south to County Road 7, and County Road 7 west to Minnesota Highway 84. The western border of the quarantine is Minnesota Highway 84 to County Road 79 and east to the county line.

Minnesota DNR invites public comment on proposed updates to the management plan for Thief Lake in Marshall County

People interested in Thief Lake in Marshall County are invited to share their thoughts with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources on proposed updates to the lake's management plan. The updated plan will be used as a guide to maintain the high-quality wetland habitat at Thief Lake.

"Public input is important as we update this plan," said Kyle Arola, Thief Lake area wildlife supervisor. "The previous management plan was developed in 2011. Updates to the plan will address current management challenges and social considerations."

The draft management plan describes past management of the lake and identifies new

thresholds that will guide specific actions such as periodic water level management. The draft plan is available for review on the Minnesota DNR website (mndnr.gov/wildlife/shallow-lakes/program-work.html).

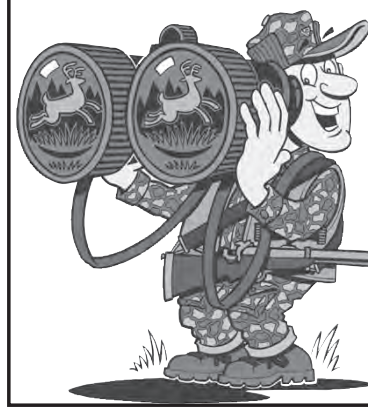
understanding of each story he shared.

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Early antlerless-only deer season is October 19-22, 2023

Hunters can participate in an early antlerless-only deer season from Thursday, Oct. 19, through Sunday, Oct. 22. The season increases opportunities for hunters in deer permit areas where deer populations are above population goals or where there is an increased risk of chronic wasting disease. Permit areas open during the hunt are 214, 215, 218, 219, 221, 222, 223, 225, 227, 229, 236, 277, 341, 342, 605, 643, 645, 646, 647, 648, 649, 661 and 701.

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources offers this opportunity to hunters to enjoy the outdoors and manage local deer herds. The bag limit is three antlerless deer and deer taken during the early antlerless-only season do not count against the statewide bag limit. Youth may not tag antlerless deer or legal bucks taken by another individual. Fabric or synthetic ground blinds on public land must have a blaze orange safety covering on top of the blind that is

visible from all directions, or a patch made of blaze orange that is at least 144 square inches (12x12 inches) on each side of the blind.

Before participating, hunters should review the specific license and permit requirements available on page 88 of the Minnesota Hunting and Trapping Regulations (mndnr.gov/regulations/hunting).
