On October 7th, 2023, the Palestinian Sunni Islamist group Hamas led surprise attacks against Israel by land, sea, and air. The assault came on a Jewish holiday, 50 years after the Egypt-Syria surprise attack that sparked the 1973 Yom Kippur War.

On the same day, Saturday, October 7th, Jim and Nina Pa-

lubicki of Fosston, Minnesota and Rick and Cheryl Mollin of Gonvick, Minnesota set off on a vacation and tour of Israel on a Delta Airline flight out of New York. Turning off their phones for the 12 hour flight, the two couples were unaware of what was happening.

Thirty-eight people were to be on the tour but their flights

into Israel were canceled. The ten that were able to get into Israel were given a short tour until they were told to get out of Israel on Friday, October 13th. They made their way to Jordan and were able to get a flight to Paris and then home on Monday, October 16.

NWMAC Showcase Specialist Trey Everett Receives the National Association for Rural Mental Health's Peter G. Beeson Rural Arts Award

The Northwest Minnesota Arts Council (NWMAC) is proud to announce that our staff person Trey Everett of Crookston recently received the Peter G. Beeson Rural Arts Award from the National Association for Rural Mental Health.

The 2023 award was presented to Trey Everett during their National Convention in Pittsburgh on September 20, 2023. Trey is a visual artist,

pastor, teacher, and spiritual guide. He mostly works with pen and ink, which includes calligrams (images made with words), lectionary art, editorial cartoons, and commissions. He also creates murals, including an outdoor mural on a building wall in downtown Crookston titled "Unity and Diversity", and art related to cinema inside the Crookston Grand Theater. At the awards ceremony, Trey

was recognized for his healing workshop with the residents of the Northwestern Apartments (NWA) transitional living facility in Crookston. Residents at NWA have mental health and often substance health challenges. Trey presented ideas of how art can be another therapeutic tool on the path of recovery. The workshop provided residents a way to touch on vulnerabilities and feelings sometimes not available in more traditional therapies. After an initial session residents spent a week with their art. Many created several art pieces. His work with people and the art he provokes are hopeful and

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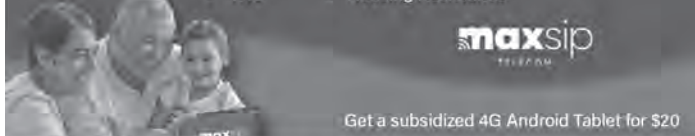

Keeping Our Kids Safe From Fentanyl

Fentanyl is cheap to produce, easy to disguise as prescription or over-the-counter pills, and can be deadly in doses small enough to fit on the tip of a pencil. Cartels have harnessed the power of social media to sell this deadly drug, leaving our kids in danger. In fact, one pill can kill.

I will never forget the story of Minnesota teenager Anastasia Shevtsova. She was struggling with depression when she bought four fentanyl-laced pills over Snapchat that killed her. Anastasia was not a drug user. She was only 15 years old – not even old enough to drive a car by herself or go to her senior prom.

Anastasia's story is sadly too common. When Devin Norring, a 19-year-old in Hastings, was suffering from dental pain and debilitating migraines, he bought what he believed was Percocet to feel better. The pill he bought was laced with fentanyl, and it killed him.

In our increasingly digital world, drug trafficking doesn't only happen in alleys or on street corners. Last year, the Drug Enforcement Administration investigated 390 drug overdose cases and found that a third of them had direct ties to social media. Anastasia and Devin's tragic stories make it clear – illegal drugs are being sold online on social media platforms, and children and teenagers are especially vulnerable. Kids can sit quietly in their rooms and use social media to buy deadly drugs. Today, anyone with a smartphone is a drug dealer's potential target.

In 2021, Minnesota had a record number of deaths from opioid overdoses. Over 90 percent of those deaths were related to synthetic opioids like fentanyl – a four-fold increase from 2018. Hundreds more Minnesotans died from opioid overdoses than from car crashes. That's an average of more than two lives lost every day.

Social media has been a gateway to drugs for too many kids, and we must meet this threat with the all-hands-on-deck response it requires.

That is why I am leading and cosponsoring several bipartisan bills to crack down on online drug dealing, including legislation to hold social media companies accountable by requiring them to report drug trafficking on their platforms to law enforcement. This will help law enforcement crack down on illegal drug sales and protect kids.

Ending the fentanyl crisis also means halting the flow of fentanyl before it ever reaches our country. Earlier this year I worked to pass the bipartisan FEND Off Fentanyl Act in the Senate, which would officially declare international fentanyl trafficking a national emergency and provide new authorities to impose tough sanctions on transnational criminal organizations in China, Mexico, or any other fentanyl supply chain hub. And in 2018, we passed my bipartisan legislation to crack down on international fentanyl and synthetic drug shipments being smuggled into the U.S. through the mail.

I am also fighting to get cutting-edge technology to detect and intercept fentanyl to our borders and bolster federal law enforcement's ability to investigate online fentanyl trafficking. These tools are important, but we also need more funding for law enforcement. That's why I lead bipartisan legislation to hire and retain more law enforcement officers.

Fentanyl isn't just a threat to those struggling with addiction. It's a threat to anyone who – maybe in a moment of pain or peer pressure – takes a single pill laced with this deadly drug. For overdose victims and their families, these fleeting moments can have permanent, tragic consequences. I don't want any more families to know this pain. On my part, I will continue working with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to tackle the scourge of fentanyl and keep our kids safe, but everyone should pass on to their kids, grandkids, neighbors, and families that "one pill kills."

Ask a Trooper

Question: What is the difference between careless or reckless driving?

less or reckless driving? What about "exhibition driving"?

Answer: In general, the difference between reckless and careless is that "reckless" is generally "intentional" or the driver "should know" that the driving behavior could injure or kill someone. Here's more detail on how they differ:

Reckless driving - This involves a motorist who's aware of and disregards the risk that their driving behavior may result in harm to another or another's property. That's considered misdemeanor reckless driving, and if the behavior results in great bodily harm or death to another person, it's then gross misdemeanor reckless driving.

A driver shall not race any vehicle on any street or high-

way. Any person who willfully compares or contests relative speeds is guilty of racing, which constitutes reckless driving. It doesn't matter whether or not the speed is over the speed limit.

Careless driving - This involves a motorist who carelessly or heedlessly operates or halts any vehicle upon any street or highway that disregards the rights of others, or endangers or is likely to endanger any property or any person. This includes endangering themselves or their passengers. This is considered misdemeanor careless driving.

Exhibition driving - Minnesota does not have an "exhibition driving" law. "Exhibition driving" is usually listed as an ordinance within cities, counties, townships, etc. In general, the difference between state law and an ordinance is that a state law is passed by your state government and is effective state wide. Ordinances are "laws"

passed by the local government — city council, county commissioners, etc. — and only in effect within that border.

I've usually seen most "exhibition driving" ordinances state: "Unreasonable acceleration of a motor vehicle or acceleration without apparent reason and accomplished in such a manner as to cause squealing or screeching sounds by the tires, or the throwing of sand or gravel by the tires of the said vehicle, or both."

Digging for China

"If you dig too deep, you'll go right on through to China!"

Dad spoke, and I believed him. As a kid in the sandbox, looking down at the hole I was digging—it looked pretty deep. After all, I'd been at it for at least five minutes and the moisture from the ground below began seeping in. Soon, the sand was no more as the soil underneath turned black.

I wondered what I would do if I did see China. I was the one digging and so I figured I'd see lights sooner than later. It was at this point I decided I'd best stop. I did have a plan though. At the first sight of China, I would begin filling it all back in. However, I also wondered if China would be able to see me—a kid in the sandbox with a shovel in hand.

I never did make it to China—whether through the sandbox or via ship or plane but I remember clearly where my thoughts had taken me that day—alone in the sandbox not knowing much more than the words dad had spoken. Funny thing is—dad never knew I was pondering his words. But why wouldn't I? He was, after

all, dad.

I've outgrown looking for China in the sandbox—but it doesn't mean I don't continue to dig and ponder and think about things my father said. The only difference is that as an adult I tend to ponder things my Heavenly Father wrote and spoke and lived because I still have so much more to learn. Although thankful for my earthly father, I'm even more thankful for God our Father who spoke Truth and speaks Truth. Thus, I continue to dig and when I do—I can see clear through to what the Almighty can do rather than my shallow view about the hole I've dug—the one He's digging me out of.

Isaiah 51:1 gives a nice twist on this topic. "Listen to me... who seek the Lord; look to the rock from which you were hewn and to the quarry from which you were dug."

Job 28:10 is interesting. "He hews out channels through the rocks, and his eye sees anything precious."

I'm no theologian, yet I love these verses which speak about digging and about rocks. There's always a broader context. That's why we have pastors who can lead and teach and preach and

to better understand it. Yet, one doesn't need to dig too deep to understand some things. Some things He taught speak for themselves without needing too many context clues.

"Jesus Christ is the Rock upon which He builds His church" (Matt. 16:18).

"For they drank from the spiritual Rock...and the Rock was Christ" (1 Corinth. 10:4).

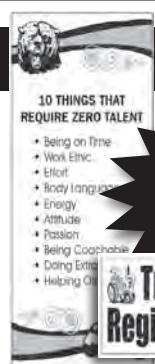
"The Lord is my Rock; my fortress...my God is my Rock in whom I take refuge" (Psalm 18:2).

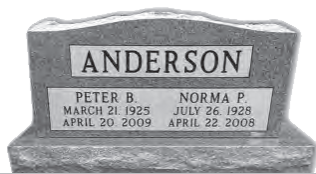

"Jamie Oliver recipe - Swedish meatballs are a traditional Scandinavian comfort food that your family will love. This recipe calls for both ground pork and ground beef. The result is a flavorful, hearty meal. Serve Swedish Meatballs with rice, over noodles, or mashed potatoes."

Recipe by: jamie-oliver

Main Ingredients:

- 2 slices white bread
- 1/4 cup milk
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1/2 cup chopped white onion
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 pound ground beef
- 3/4 pound ground pork
- 2 egg yolks
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon allspice
- 1/4 cup flour
- 3 cups beef broth
- 1/4 cup heavy whipping cream

Cooking Preparation of the Recipe:

1. Preheat oven to 200 degrees F.
2. Tear the bread into pieces and place in a mixing bowl with milk, set aside.
3. Melt 1 tablespoon of butter in a sauté pan, add onion; sauté onion until soft, remove from heat.
4. Combine milk and bread mixture, ground beef, ground pork, egg yolks, salt, pepper, allspice, and onions in a mixing bowl; beat on medium speed for 1 to 2 minutes; roll mixture into 1-inch rounds.
5. Brown meatballs in a sauté pan over medium-high heat for 7 to 10 minutes; place meatballs on pan and place in the oven to warm.
6. Heat the pan on low heat and add flour; whisk until lightly brown, approximately 1 to 2 minutes; slowly add the beef stock and whisk until sauce begins to thicken; add cream and continue to cook the gravy until desired consistency is reached.
7. Remove meatballs from oven and cover with gravy.

Top Ten Reasons to Join A Club

10. Snowmobile clubs gain land access to create snowmobile trails. Without the clubs securing land leases and paying insurance costs, no trails would cross private property, and that means the sport as we know it would not exist. All this takes time, effort and money.

9. Snowmobile clubs clear and create trails. After the land access is received, somebody has to go out and clear away the brush, cut down interfering limbs, haul out trash and smooth the base of the trail. They also must build bridges over creeks, rivers and low spots, and that takes a lot of work and a lot of money. This is all done by volunteers who truly love the sport. Without these hidden heroes, either the trails would not get cleared, bridges would not get built and most trails would close, or some entity (say, the state) would have to pay a team of workers to do the grunt work. And if that happened, you could expect to pay several hundred dollars, maybe even a thousand, to register your snowmobile each year.

8. In most areas, members of the snowmobile clubs groom the trails. Sometimes these groomer operators get a token fee for their hard work, but the dollar-per-hour rate is menial at best, and that's when a groomer operator actually gets paid. Again, these are more of the hidden heroes who spend their time in a slow-moving groomer, tending to the trails and making them as smooth as they are. Remember, if you are not a club member you have no right to complain about trail conditions.

7. While we're talking trails, who do you think puts up all the stop signs, the directional arrows and the signs that tell you the distance to the next gas station or restaurant? If you said "the snowmobile clubs," give yourself 10 points and keep reading, because we've only just begun.

6. When funding is needed to pay for groomers, insurance or trails development, do you know where that money comes from? Sure, the \$15 or \$20 people spend to join a snowmobile club helps, but in most states the money comes from snowmobile registrations and gas tax rebates. Why does our sport get this money from the state? Because our sport is organized. If the state snowmobiling association can talk about its 25,000 members, for example, and those members call their local lawmakers and ask for support, the bill has a much better chance of getting funded. Furthermore, it is the snowmobile clubs and state associations that fight the battles to open public lands to snowmobilers, and there is strength in numbers. Become one of those numbers.

5. With some clubs and associations, membership brings financial benefits. I know I get a couple grand worth of accidental insurance, I get discounts at sponsoring businesses and I get the state publication. All this and more for a mere \$20 a year.

4. Belonging to a club makes for better, safer snowmobiling. That's right, surveys and accident statistics have shown that snowmobile club members have a much lower accident rate than non-club members. Why? Because club members tend to be conscientious, they tend to stress safety and they are aware of safe-riding issues.

3. Belonging to a snowmobile club gives you a great social outlet for your favorite hobby. You can attend club rides, go to club meetings, take part in club fundraisers or take a club trip to a faraway snowmobiling destination. Belonging to a club gives you a good opportunity to ride with different people, experience different areas and hang out with people who have similar interests.

2. Belonging to a snowmobile club makes you a part of the solution instead of a part of the problem. If you think the snowmobile trails should be groomed more often, that a certain trail should move to the opposite side of the road or if you consider some corners on the trail dangerous or poorly marked, get involved. Most snowmobile clubs seek fresh opinions and want more feedback from users.

1. And the No. 1 reason to join a snowmobile club: It's just the right thing to do. For all the reasons listed above and many more you should belong to a snowmobile club. The costs are minimal, the benefits are nice and it is your responsibility to support the sport. It's cheap, it's simple and it's right.

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
