Young Author's Conference coming up for local students

Northwest Service Cooperative is hosting a Young Authors Conference on March 8th for area students in grades 5-8. This event will be held at Northland Community and Technical College in Thief River Falls from 9am-2pm.
The Young Authors Conference is designed to encourage and inspire young writers, promoting student enthusiasm and competence in written communication. Through interaction with established authors, poets, playwrights, storytellers, illustrators, journalists and teachers of writing, students discover and explore their writing talents and potential. This year students will be able to attend 3 different sessions throughout the day, participate in a book fair and an autograph session with authors and illustrators.
The YAC has 424 students registered already from 23 area schools and two homeschooled families! Each student registered within their school with each district limited to 35 students.

The Jensen Sisters: Writing a Song.
Kari Sundberg is one of the local presenters at the YAC. She has been writing professionally for over a dozen years, and personally for much longer than that. She is the editor/writer for the Grygla Eagle Newspaper and also does freelance writing for various publications around the state of Minnesota. In addition to her full-time job, Kari is also a full-time student at the University of Minnesota Crookston. She is finishing her Bachelor of Science in Communications and has added a Humanities Minor with an English/Writing Emphasis. Her future writing goals include publishing a fiction novel and freelance writing for a national magazine. Kari is traveling to Scotland for ten days in March as part of a global studies program through the U of M.
Kari's session for the YAC is called What is a Sestina? A sestina is a type of formal poem which follows a strict form and is usually unrhyming. It consists of 39 lines – six six-line stanzas, following by a three-line stanza. The writer must choose six different words which will be used as the last word in each line of the poem. As the lines continue, the words shift in order and continue to do so until the end. Because the sestina has such a strict pattern, many writers find that writing sestinas help them to explore their creativity.
Stephanie Olson is another presenter at the Young Author's Conference. She is currently the English teacher for grades 7-12 at Goodridge Public School. She earned her Writing MFA from Hamline University and has served on several literary editorial boards, including Water-Stone Review and Red Bird Chapbooks. Her work as appeared in a handful of publications, most recently with Tiny Seed Journal. She lives the rural life with her family, dogs, and cat, and she hopes you try writing at least one thing down today.
Stephanie is presenting Beyond the Blank Page. Students will explore ways to write without the need to come up with any words. That's right, no blank pages here! The group will explore blackout poetry and collage poetry, with participants leaving with insight on how to experiment and overcome writer's block.
The Jensen Sisters, Kendra and Kansas, from rural Goodridge, have been singing together since 2015. They are a modern duo rooted in the old-school twang of the country singers, outlaws, and roots-rockers who came before them. The harmony-singing sisters have performed on stages all across the Midwest and are armed with original songs.
They will be conducting a song-writing session at the Young Author's Conference at NCTC where students will be able to bring some song lyrics to life on paper.
The Young Adult Conference is being hosted by Northwest Service Cooperative with Sadie Miller, of rural Goodridge, as the Student Program Coordinator.

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Woinarowicz: DNR Conservation Officer of the Year

Minnesota Department of Natural Resources Conservation Officer Jeremy Woinarowicz has been named the 2022 DNR Conservation Officer of the Year, which is an annual award presented to an officer for outstanding overall career performance. Col. Rodmen Smith, director of the DNR Enforcement Division, presented awards to Woinarowicz and four other officers earlier this week at Camp Ripley.
Woinarowicz works the Thief River Falls West station, where he's been since joining the DNR in 2004. His station includes parts of Marshall, Pennington and Polk counties, but he also often covers stations that include the rest of Marshall County, as well as Beltrami and Kittson counties. Before joining the DNR, Woinarowicz spent several years as a police officer in East Grand Forks, Minnesota, and Grand Forks, North Dakota. In addition to his regular duty as a conservation officer to protect Minnesota's people and natural resources, Woinarowicz spends time every year training the state's newest conservation officers.
"Jeremy is a highly visible and well-known conservation officer, and we couldn't ask for a better representative of the DNR," Smith said. "With Jeremy, you know what you're going to get day in and day out: A conservation officer who is firm but fair and does his best every day to protect the things Minnesotans care so deeply about."
In addition, Woinarowicz was named the 2022 Minnesota Wildlife Officer of the Year by the Shikar Safari Club International.

Explore Minnesota’s scenic 57-mile Gunflint Trail on an unforgettable winter adventure

Although many people may associate it with paddling the Boundary Waters and summer hiking or fishing, if you’re looking for a winter adventure in the North Star State, you should put Minnesota’s Gunflint Trail trip at the top of your list.

Minnesota’s Gunflint Trail stretches 57 miles from Lake Superior and the charming lakeside outpost of Grand Marais to an arm of Saganaga Lake, which straddles the Canadian Border. The Gunflint, as it’s often called, was designated a National Scenic Byway in 2009, but its history goes back hundreds of years. The route generally follows a footpath once used by Native Americans and fur-trading voyageurs to negotiate the region’s numerous lakes and the challenging peaks of the Misquah Hills. It was first improved as a road in the late 19th century to provide access to an iron ore mine that almost immediately failed. The modern Gunflint Trail was not fully paved until nearly a century later, in 1979.

Now, it’s a gateway to numerous resorts, lodges, and outfitters to the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness, which the road bisects. Several major footpaths, including the Superior Hiking, Border Route, and Kekekabic Trails, all have trailheads along the Gunflint. The clear, clean lakes are renowned for their fishing opportunities, as well as exploration by adventurous paddlers. But winter takes adventuring on the Gunflint Trail up a notch.

The gateway to the Gunflint Trail is in Grand Marais, on Lake Superior.

The first part of the Trail is a steep climb toward the Lake Superior uplands. You can stop at the Pincushion Mountain overlook, just past the iconic “Gunflint Trail” water tower on the left side of the road. The views out over Grand Marais and Lake Superior are stunning. The Pincushion Mountain trailhead is also the first place to access the massive network of cross-country ski trails along Minnesota’s Gunflint Trail.

The nearby George Washington Pines Winter Recreation Trail - just before you reach the “Guardians of the Gunflint,” towering

white pines on either side of the road - is a great short trail for beginners, as well snowshoers and skijorers.

With more than 400km of groomed trails, the network includes the Upper and Central Gunflint systems, as well as the Banadad Ski Trail. Bearskin Lodge’s Nordic Center is an awesome place to start because it offers several levels of trail difficulty and terrain. Always be on the lookout for moose and other wildlife on the Gunflint - especially as you approach mid-trail. They’re attracted to the road as both a way to avoid deep snow and for the salt that’s used to battle ice.

Similarly, snowmobiles often cross Minnesota’s Gunflint Trail. Because the mid-trail resorts are so close to the road, you may find yourself sharing the right of way with a sled on occasion.

Mid-trail is always a great place to stop for lunch, and you’ll find quite a few options.

Trail Center Lodge and Restaurant is always a solid choice. It’s also an awesome spot for breakfast. There is also Big Bear Lodge, which came under new ownership in 2022 and quickly gained renown for its artisan pizza, as well as Poplar Haus and Justine’s Bistro, to name a few.

After lunch, you can continue along the Gunflint, past frozen lakes and through the misty, snow-blanketed Misquah Hills and Superior National Forest.

Evening lodging can include the Gunflint Lodge. It feels just like a historic North Woods lodge should feel. It’s rustic and comfortable, as well as cozy and welcoming. The Lodge is a perfect base camp for winter adventures of all kinds. You can ice skate, cross country ski, snowshoe, or snowmobile right from the resort. (Not to mention enjoy a bonfire and hot drink).

The lodge can also arrange other winter adventures, from ice fishing to wildlife viewing with a naturalist, during your stay.

No matter what adventure you take along the Gunflint this winter, you’ll be sure to enjoy it! Just make sure you pack the essentials for winter travel, so you are properly prepared for the cold-weather adventure.

Bruschetta Chicken

Bruschetta levels up from appetizer territory in this suppertime spin on a classic. Grilled (or baked, your choice) chicken plays host to diced tomatoes, basil and a tangy balsamic glaze in this quick and easy main dish conversion. Pay homage to summer and go as fresh as possible with your produce for the best flavor in Bruschetta Chicken!

Ingredients
4 6-oz boneless skinless chicken breasts
2 tsp italian seasoning
1 tsp kosher salt
1 tsp onion powder
1 tsp garlic powder
1 tsp ground pepper
1-2 tbsp olive oil
Bruschetta
3-4 medium ripe tomatoes (about 1 lb) cored, seeded, and chopped to a ½” dice
1 tsp kosher salt
2 cloves garlic minced
1 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
2 tsp balsamic vinegar
2 tbsp thinly sliced basil leaves
ground pepper to taste
balsamic glaze to taste, optional

Instructions
Start the bruschetta. Combine the chopped tomatoes with salt and garlic in a mixing bowl; mix until well combined, then let sit while the chicken cooks.

Prepare the chicken. Place one chicken breast onto a sheet of parchment paper. Fold the paper over the chicken. Using a rolling pin, pound the chicken breast to even thickness of a little less than 1”. Set aside and repeat with the remaining chicken breasts.

Combine the italian seasoning, salt, garlic powder, onion powder, and pepper in a small bowl. Stir to combine.

Brush the chicken with olive oil, then sprinkle with the seasoning blend. Flip the chicken over, then oil and season the other side.

To Grill: heat a grill or grill pan over high heat. Place the chicken breasts directly on the grill grates and cook 5-6 minutes per side, or until the internal temperature reads 165°F using an instant read thermometer. Remove from the grill and rest 5 minutes.

To Bake: heat the oven to 400°F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. Roast the chicken for 10-12 minutes. Remove from the oven and rest five minutes.

Finish the bruschetta topping. Stir in the olive oil, balsamic vinegar, fresh basil, and ground pepper to taste. Taste for seasoning and adjust with salt, pepper, or vinegar to taste.

Top the grilled chicken with the bruschetta. Serve immediately.
