Community Center Flooring Project

The Grygla Community Center Flooring Project is complete. The project was taken on by the Grygla Lion's Club. Members made a commitment to the project that they would have volunteers donate their time and effort to remove the old flooring; Concrete Designs out of Thief River Falls did the work on the new floors. \$31,000 in grants, donations and memorials was collected

for the project that brought new flooring to the entire building, including the kitchen and bathrooms. April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM)

Violence Intervention Project, a local nonprofit that serves domestic and sexual violence victims, is focusing on ways that individuals, communities, and the private sector can help prevent sexual violence. Nearly one in four women and one in 26 men are victims of sexual assault, but all of us are impacted by sexual violence. Everyone understands that sexual violence impacts victims and their families, but the effects of this violent crime on communities and society are less obvious. Sexual violence creates a climate of fear, anger, and/or disbelief in the workplaces, campuses, and communities that it occurs in.

Additionally, sexual violence generates criminal justice, medical, crisis and mental health service expenses. Perhaps most damaging are the lost contributions of survivors. Rape alone results in more than \$122,000 in costs per victim and nearly \$3.1 trillion to the economy over the lifetimes of all 25 million victims in the US population. Preventing such a far-reaching and prevalent social issue as sexual violence may seem overwhelming or even impossible. This mentality implies that there isn't a solution — or if there is, we can't achieve it. But we can and we are. There are many practical steps that

are currently being taken in our homes, neighborhoods, schools, faith communities, and workplaces. However, there are many more things we can do to promote safety, respect, and accountability. Prevention starts with challenging victim-blaming and believing survivors when they disclose. Individuals can model supportive relationships and behaviors, call out harmful attitudes and behaviors, and challenge the societal acceptance of rape. Communities and businesses can take action to implement policies that promote safety, respect, and equality. Prevention is Possible!

Please join us in helping everyone see their role in preventing sexual violence. VIP is partnering with local coffee shops to promote awareness with coffee sleeves. Bear hunt lottery apps available

Prospective bear hunters have until Friday, May 5, to apply for a bear hunting license from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. Applications for the 2023 season can be submitted online, at any license agent or by telephone at 888-665-4236.
A total of 4,035 licenses are available in 14 permit areas for the season, which opens Friday, Sept. 1, and closes Sunday, Oct. 15.
The number of permits available each year in the quota zone is based on Minnesota's bear population, which has stabilized and started to increase during the past 10 years, in part because of recent conservative permit quotas. Populations in most bear permit areas are stable to increasing, and the total number of permits has increased by 430 from last season. The exceptions are in several permit areas in northern Minnesota, which will see permit reductions in efforts to stabilize populations in those areas.

These 5 celebrities hail from some of Minnesota's most charming small towns

The Land of 10,000 Lakes is not California or New York, but there is still a pretty fair number of Minnesota celebrities who hail from our fair state. While most of them, like Prince, F. Scott Fitzgerald, Joe Mauer, or Paul Molitor, are from the Twin Cities, there are many who once called some of the North Star State's smaller cities and communities their hometowns. And there's something that's extra special in rooting for a small-town kid done good. Here's a handful of celebrities who come from Minnesota's smaller communities.

Jessica Biel, Ely - Actress Jessica Biel hails from the charming town of Ely, Minnesota. Ely is an outdoor mecca. As a gateway to the Boundary Waters and Superior National Forest, Ely is considered Minnesota's headquarters for North Woods adventuring.

Bob Dylan, Hibbing - Born Robert Zimmerman in a Duluth hospital, Bob Dylan grew up in Hibbing, where he is hailed as a hometown hero. The Iron Range city of Hibbing has deep mining roots, which brings with it a boom-and-bust economy.

Judy Garland, Grand Rapids - Originally named Frances Gumm, Judy Garland went on to become one of Hollywood's best-known stars in the first half of the 20th century. Today, her childhood home is part of the Judy Garland Museum, which is one of Grand Rapids' popular attractions. The town is also known as a gateway city to the Chippewa National Forest.

Jessica Lange, Cloquet - Academy Award-winning actress Jessica Lange comes from Cloquet. (Later in life, she returned to the state for a while and lived in the Stillwater area). Cloquet sits at the confluence of two rivers and is close to both Jay Cooke State Park and the Sax-Zim Bog.

Winona Ryder, Winona - There could be stranger things than the fact that Winona Ryder was named for the city in which she was born. At the time, her family lived in rural Olmsted County, but Winona is Ms. Ryder's official birthplace. The charming city of Winona sits on the Mississippi River in Minnesota's Bluff Country. Ms. Ryder once lent her name and image to one of the city's tourism campaigns, which included a Super Bowl commercial.

Minnesota's moose count down; population remains relatively stable

This year's population estimate of 3,290 moose marks a decade of Minnesota's moose population remaining relatively stable, according to the results of the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources' 2023 aerial population survey.

Although the estimate dropped from 2022's estimate of 4,700, the change continues to reflect the population stability observed in previous years. After a decline from a population estimate of approximately 8,000 in 2009, Minnesota's moose population appears to have stabilized at about 3,700 animals in recent years.

Stabilized doesn't mean the population is constant, said John Giudice, DNR wildlife biometrician. Instead, annual changes since 2013 appear to be relatively small on average and random, with some years showing a population increase and others a decrease.

Although survey results suggest a decrease in the moose population from 2022 to 2023, those estimates are better used to understand long-term trends. Factors such as visibility of moose from the air, challenging weather conditions and moose avoidance of aircraft create moderately high sampling uncertainty. That uncertainty makes it difficult for researchers to make confident statements about the magnitude of annual population changes unless those changes are relatively large.

But data collected recently by researchers with the Grand Portage Band of Lake Superior Chippewa suggest the magnitude of this year's decline could be more than an artifact of sampling. They have reported high mortality rates on collared moose and similar decreases in aerial surveys around Grand Portage and Isle Royale. Continued comparisons in coming years will help answer that question.

The 2023 DNR survey results showed that calves comprised an estimated 16% of the population and the estimated calf-cow ratio was 38 calves per 100 cows. Those estimates are slightly lower than last year's figures but are comparable to values observed during the last 10 years, especially considering moderate-to-high levels of sampling uncertainty. Both factors are key indicators of reproductive success.

While estimates suggest continued stability in the population and reproductive success, DNR researchers point out that Minnesota moose remain at risk given long-term trends

Both the Fond du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa and the 1854 Treaty Authority contributed funding and personnel for the 2023 annual survey. The survey is available on the DNR's moose management page (mndnr.gov/moose).

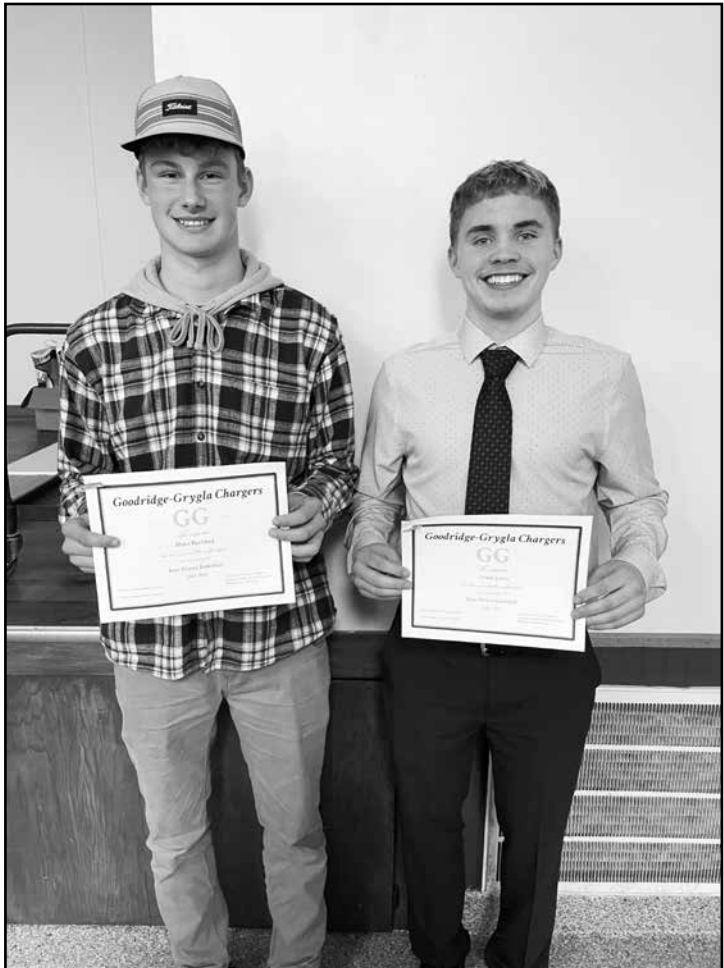

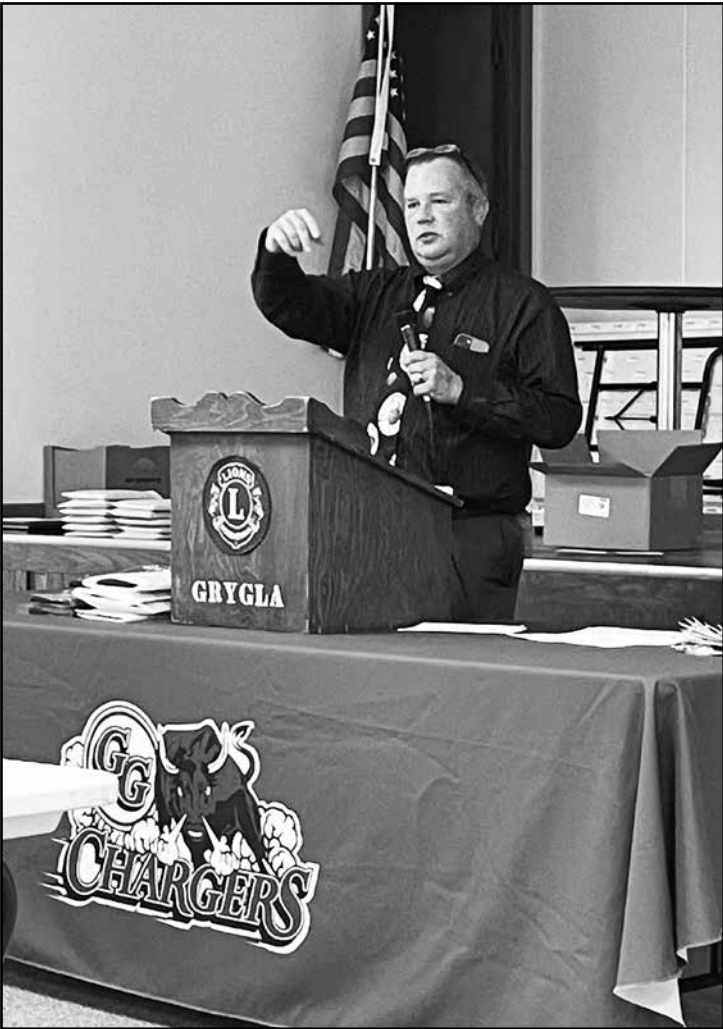
