FFF was a hit with families in the Grygla community



FFF is a new thing that began in Grygla last fall and proved to be really successful over the winter. It just wrapped up recently with 25 kids putting on a program to conclude the weekly event that took place at Grace Lutheran Church in Grygla. FFF stands for "Faith, Food and Family" and it's a program that happened every Wednesday night. Faith, Food and Family night is an after-school program that was open to all students Kindergarten and older, along with their families. It was open to anyone, not just members of Grace Lutheran Church. FFF began last October after the church received a grant for \$4,000 that was used mostly to purchase groceries to make the meals that happened every Wednesday. Vicar Marilyn Grafstrom, along with church council members, had many conversations about how to serve more people in the community, whether they are members of the Grace congregation or not. Many ideas were brought to the table; some included preparing a meal for families one night a week, having Sunday School on a weekday, and also holding a time for families to all gather together. FFF came together as a trial run of some of those ideas.

Vicar Marilyn and Tony Moe were a part of "Practicing Resurrection" by the NWMN Synod of the ELCA. They had applied for the grant through that project. Vicar Marilyn says, "This vision came out of a dream story we wrote as part of practicing resurrection based on an assessment that included interviews in the community and with church members." FFF night is held every Wednesday and replaces Sunday School. Vicar Marilyn added, "Tausha Severts was the driver behind Sunday School on Wednesday evenings instead of Sundays, and it's been very popular with kids and families." How does FFF work? Well, it started after school every Wednesday. Kids K-6, along with their parents, could attend. Usually the group did music right away, led by Vicar Marilyn, then they split up into age groups for that week's Bible lesson. Kids then had some free time to play games, do puzzles, read books, or do homework with their peers. Supper was served from 5-6:30pm. At that time, anyone could come and eat with the kids from the community – not just family members! There are a variety of volunteers who deserve recognition that made this new event such a success. A few of them

include the older high school students who went in and spent time with the younger kids and helped them; those students earned NHS credit and volunteer hours, also! Hazel Thomas was the main cook for the group! Tausha Severts, Gretchen Smeby, Amy Holte, Shaunna Olson and Vicar Marilyn all lent a hand when it came to the music and weekly lessons. FFF had help from Grace and Our Savior's WELCA and community members who all donated food

to help the grant money stretch a bit more. There have also been many parent, grandparent and community volunteers whom have all joined together to share in the FFF vision. FFF nights were such a success with around 30 students attending every week and the cooks serving anywhere from 60-70 people total each time. The May meeting of the City Council was held at the Grygla Civic Building on Monday, May 8th. Council members approved the April minutes, which are included below. Official minutes are taken by Grygla City Clerk and recapped by Eagle Editor. For the full version, including receipts & disbursements, visit www.grygla.govoffice2.com The regular meeting on April 10th was called to order at 7pm at the Civic Building by Mayor Ruud with the following council members present: Dustin Nelson, Dave Dunrud, Gavin Nordby and Karla Byklum. Absent: None. Also present: Rick Neuschwander, Carson Saurdiff, and Rose Aune. Council approved minutes, along with receipts, disbursements, checking, savings & total balances for that month. The payment of all bills was also approved. Other items included:

LAND LEASE BIDS
Rick Neuschwander and Carson Saurdiff were present. Robbie Anderson sent in a sealed bid. Starting bids for the 46.57 acres were Robbie \$55/acre, Rick \$35/acre, Carson \$75/acre. Since Carson and Rick were present, they were allowed to up their bids. After a few offers going back and forth, Rick was highest bid at \$95/acre. Nordby made a motion, seconded by Byklum to accept Rick Neuschwander's bid of \$95/acre for 46.57 acres. Motion was carried unanimously.

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Marshall County Sheriff's Office Dispatch-Jailer Job Opening

The Marshall County Sheriff's Office is accepting employment applications for the position of Jailer-Dispatcher. This position starts out at (\$22.46) for day shift and (\$25.46) for night shift. After 6-months the wages go up to (\$23.01) for day shift and (\$26.01) for night shift and after 1 year of employment the wages go up to (\$23.77) for day shift and (\$26.77) for night shift.

This position works 12-hour shifts. The shifts are from 6:00 am - 6:00 pm and 6:00 pm - 6:00 am. Shifts include working holidays and weekends. If an employee works on a holiday, they receive 12 hours of overtime pay. There are always 2 dispatchers/jailers on at all times. The employee never works more than 3 days in a row.

The Marshall County Sheriff's Office has an excellent benefit package. If the employee takes a family stipend health insurance plan, they are given \$1,550.00 towards the premium. If they elect a single health insurance stipend, they are given \$870.00 a month towards the premium. If a spouse has health insurance, the employee is given \$870.00 per month. That would make each paycheck \$435.00 more. Each employee accrues 4 hours vacation and accrues 4 hours of sick time each paycheck. There are 26 pay periods in a year. On top of vacation hours each employee gets 92 hours of holiday hours they can use as vacation hours.

There is a sign on bonus of \$2,000. The employee will get \$500.00 on first pay check, \$500.00 at 6 months once completed probation period, and \$1,000 at 1 year anniversary.

May is Community Action month

2023 marks the 59th year since the Community Action Network was established to help American families and communities overcome obstacles to poverty. Over 1000 agencies across the country are working every day to create opportunities and transform the lives of their neighbors making communities stronger and helping families across the US thrive. This year, Northwest Community Action, Inc., a proud member of the Community Action Network, commemorates 58 years of helping families throughout Roseau, Kittson, Lake of the Woods and Marshall Counties.
"Each May, during Community

Action Month, we reflect on the impact NWCA and our network has had on families," said Sharon Millner, Executive Director. "Last year alone, Community Action served nearly 2,000 people across northwest Minnesota and over 15 million across the country with immediately needed services such as shelter and food, and also long-term solutions like education, asset building, financial literacy training and job search."

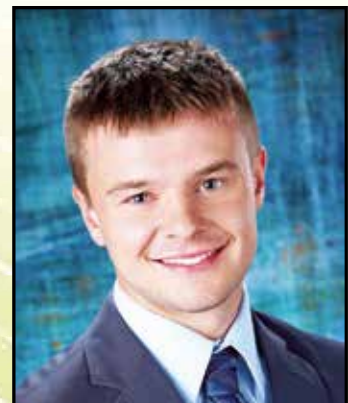

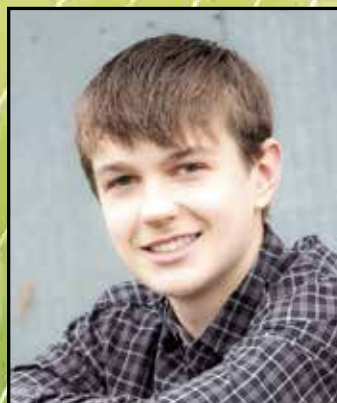
