Northwest Partnership now accepting proposals for community projects

Northwest Minnesota residents with an idea to strengthen sustainability in their community can now apply for partnership support from the University of Minnesota Extension Southeast Regional Sustainable Development Partnerships (Northwest RSDP).

Northwest RSDP supports local innovation by connecting community ideas to University of Minnesota resources. Community members work on diverse project teams that research, design and plan local sustainability projects with University students, faculty and staff.

Northwest RSDP has several resource opportunities to support community-university partnerships. Residents and organizations are encouraged to submit their sustainability project ideas through the RSDP idea brief application. The RSDP annual call for ideas has supported hundreds of sustainability projects in the Northwest region for over twenty-five years. RSDP is also seeking applications from local farmers interested in building a deep winter greenhouse using the latest University researched design. Additionally, RSDP is launching a new program, "Empowering Small Minnesota Communities," to help small Minnesota communities benefit from federal, state and local investments. This program is seeking applications from communities interested in collaborating with the University to advance or plan projects that support sustainable economic, social, or transportation infrastructure.

"Community members know best how to make changes toward stronger social connections, valuing nature and fostering a home-grown economy. We're excited to hear what comes next for your community, and share with you how the RSDP can help," said Northwest RSDP Executive Director Shannon Stassen. "I encourage people to get in touch with me to talk about their ideas for making our communities more sustainable places."

Applications for all resources are being accepted through February 14. Visit the link z.umn.edu/RSDPIdeaBrief to read more about the programs and to apply. Successful projects are selected by the Northwest RSDP community-university governing board through a competitive process.

The Northwest RSDP serves Kittson, Roseau, Lake of the Woods, Marshall, Pennington, Red Lake, Clearwater, Beltrami, Polk, Norman, Mahanomen, Clay and Wilkin counties and the Red Lake Nation and White Earth Nation.

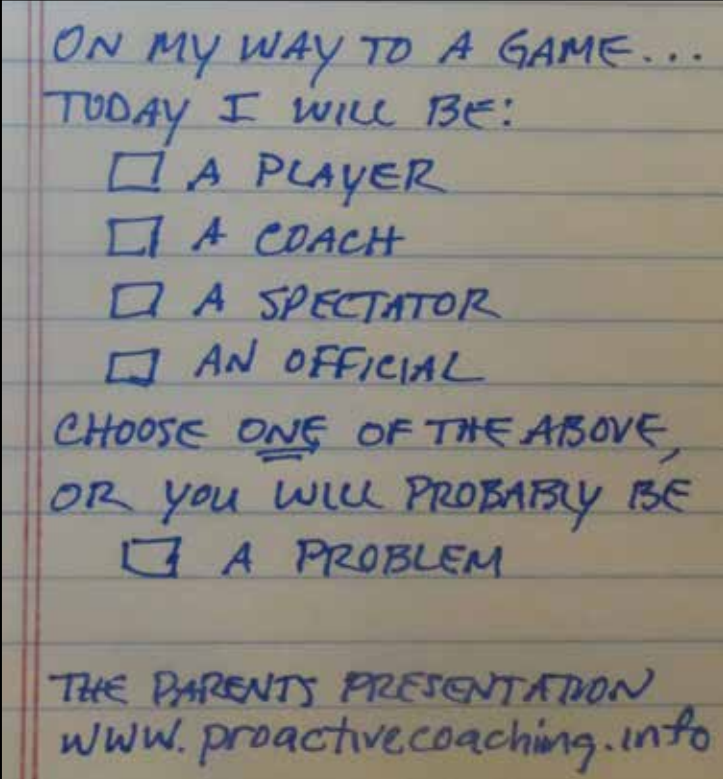

The book sale, which will also include audiobooks and DVD's, will be running on the following dates/times at the Grygla Community Center:

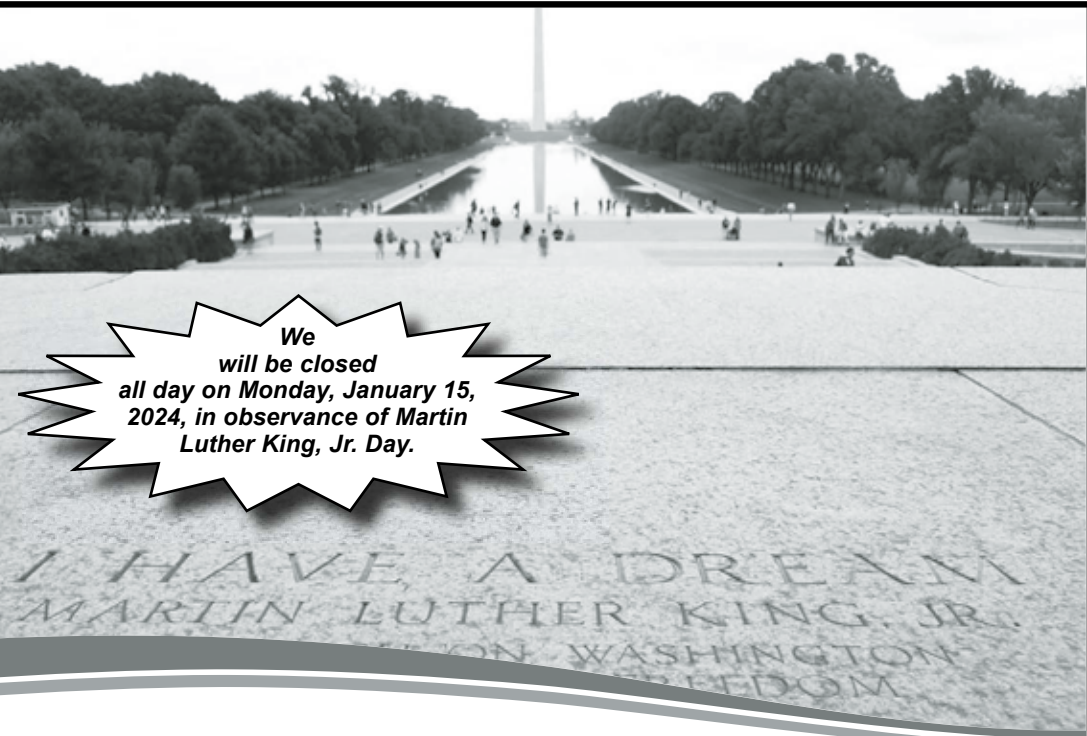

DNR looking to fill 200 paid summer internships

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is looking for passionate and dedicated students interested in learning more about natural resource careers through paid summer internships. DNR summer interns gain valuable training, build meaningful experience and help create a healthy, sustainable, and inclusive Minnesota.

The DNR has a wide variety of internship opportunities throughout the state, including in fisheries, forestry, park operations, watercraft inspections, communications and more. Interns work 20 to 40 hours per week and receive a competitive wage of \$19 per hour. To be considered for an internship, fulfilling an academic requirement or receiving academic credit is required.

First Free Park Day of 2024 at Minnesota state parks and recreation areas is Jan. 15

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is waiving vehicle permit fees at all 75 state parks and recreation areas on Monday, Jan. 15.

With this year's unusual weather, it's good to know there are many winter park activities that don't require snow or ice, such as birding, winter hiking, nature photography, and having a campfire with hot chocolate and s'mores.

And, if sufficient snow arrives before Jan. 15, visitors can also partake in popular winter activities like sledding, snowshoeing and cross-country skiing. Most parks offer snowshoe rentals, and select parks offer ski rentals. Visitors looking for rental equipment or certain recreational opportunities can use the ParkFinder tool (mndnr.gov/parkfinder) to find the best park for their trip.

The DNR recommends visitors wear clothing appropriate for the weather and bring water and snacks. If trails could be icy, traction devices for footwear are useful.

This "Free Park Day" is one of four days each year on which the DNR waives the requirement for a vehicle permit at state parks and recreation areas. Four free park days are scheduled for Minnesota state parks and recreation areas in 2024 including:

- Monday, Jan. 15
- Saturday, April 27
- Saturday, June 8
- Friday, Nov. 29

"Minnesota state parks and recreation areas are open 365 days per year, but some visitors only visit in summer," said Ann Pierce, director of the DNR Parks and Trails Division. "We hope having a free day in each season will encourage people to get out and visit a park at a time of year they might not normally visit."

Visitors are advised to check for updates in the visitor alert section of individual park webpages (mndnr.gov/parks) before leaving home. Visitors may also download free maps from park webpages, which can be used in the free Avenza maps app, available in the Apple App Store or Google Play. Visitors who prefer a paper map can pick one up at the ranger station; look outside the station if it's closed when you arrive.

The entrance fee waiver for fee-free days does not cover amenity or user fees for activities like camping or equipment rentals.

It's just you and Mother Nature at Hayes Lake State Park

Did you know that Minnesota has more than 60 state parks? There are 66, to be exact! And that doesn't even count the many state recreation areas, scientific and natural areas, and other similar spots. All of this to say that we wouldn't be surprised if there are one or two dozen nature areas in Minnesota that you've never heard of, especially to those that live outside of this area. One such place might be Hayes Lake State Park, a little-known Minnesota park full of things to do. It's one of the least-visited state parks in Minnesota, so it'll be just you and Mother Nature when you visit.

Hayes Lake State Park is a little-known state park in Roseau County, Minnesota. It's in northern Minnesota, not far from the Canadian border. Given its remote location, it's no wonder this park is one of the least-visited in Minnesota. But that doesn't mean it's not worth seeing. Its nearly 3,000 acres are full of nature and beauty. You won't likely run into too many other people here! There is plenty to do at Hayes Lake State Park. The lake that gives the park its name is a beautiful, tree-lined body of water

that is full of fish. Many enjoy casting a line off the big fishing pier. Crappie, northern, largemouth bass, and sunfish have all been pulled from the lake.

Canoeing and kayaking in the lake are also popular. It's not uncommon to hear the call of the loon while you paddle. You may even spot a deer along the shore.

Hayes Lake even has a sandy area perfect for swimming. The clean waters of the lake, combined with the sandy beach, make it a great destination for family fun.

Beyond the lake, this park has plenty to do! There are around 13 miles of hiking trails that take visitors along the lake, the Roseau River, and even through a bog. Along the way, you'll spot plenty of interesting plants and wildlife. More than 200 types of birds have been spotted here, as well as moose, bear, porcupines, beavers, and more. Colorful wildflowers also make hikes fun during warmer months.

The best way to enjoy Hayes Lake State Park to its fullest is to camp there. There are 35 campsites, as well as a camper cabin for those who don't want to tent it. You'll love your visit to this remote park full of beauty.

Art grants funding available

Applications are open for Project Grants for nonprofit arts organizations, communities, schools, and other nonprofit organizations from our seven county Minnesota service area including Kittson, Marshall, Norman, Pennington, Polk, Red Lake, and Roseau counties.

Nonprofits and government organizations can apply for one arts project at a time. Upcoming grants deadlines for these are February 29. Grants are between \$500 and \$10,000. Funding sources for these grants are Clean Water, Land and Legacy funds and general allocation funds from the State of Minnesota.

Organizational arts activities funded through these very important grant opportunities include festivals, community theatre projects, folk music entertainment, sponsorship of visual demonstrations, creative writing workshops and many other activities that improve the quality of life of people in our communities. This is a great way to bring arts experiences to your community.

We are offering a grant writing workshop online or in person to assist you with your application. You are welcome to come to our office in Warren for the workshop or to work on your grants. RSVPs are required for grant writing sessions – please email director@nwartsCouncil.org.

The session will be held Tuesday, February 13 at 10:00 AM. You can also set up a time to work one-on-one with our

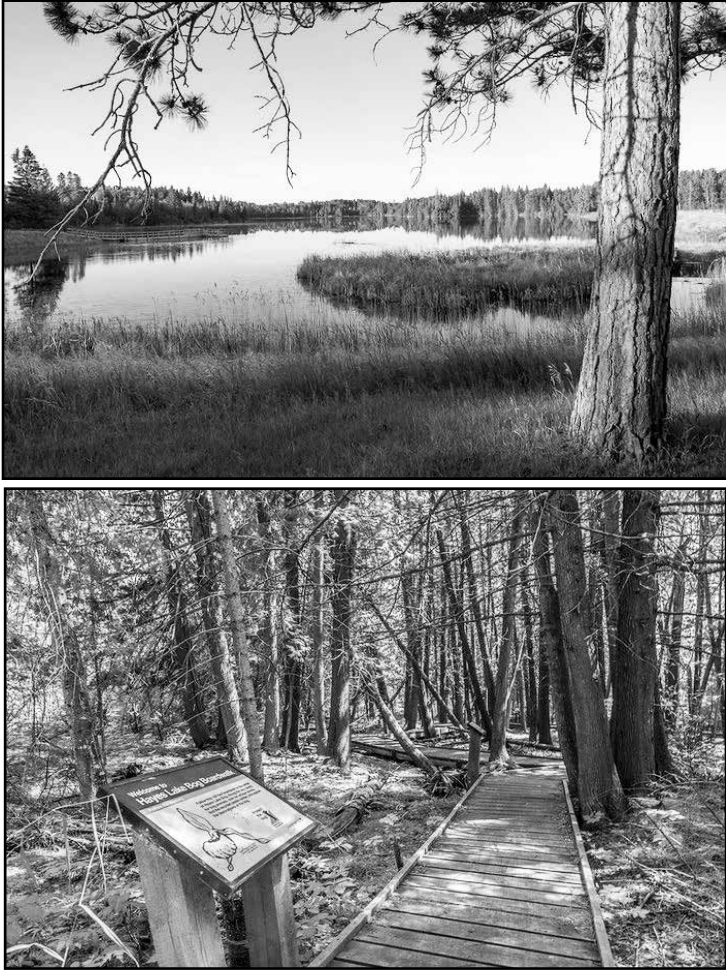
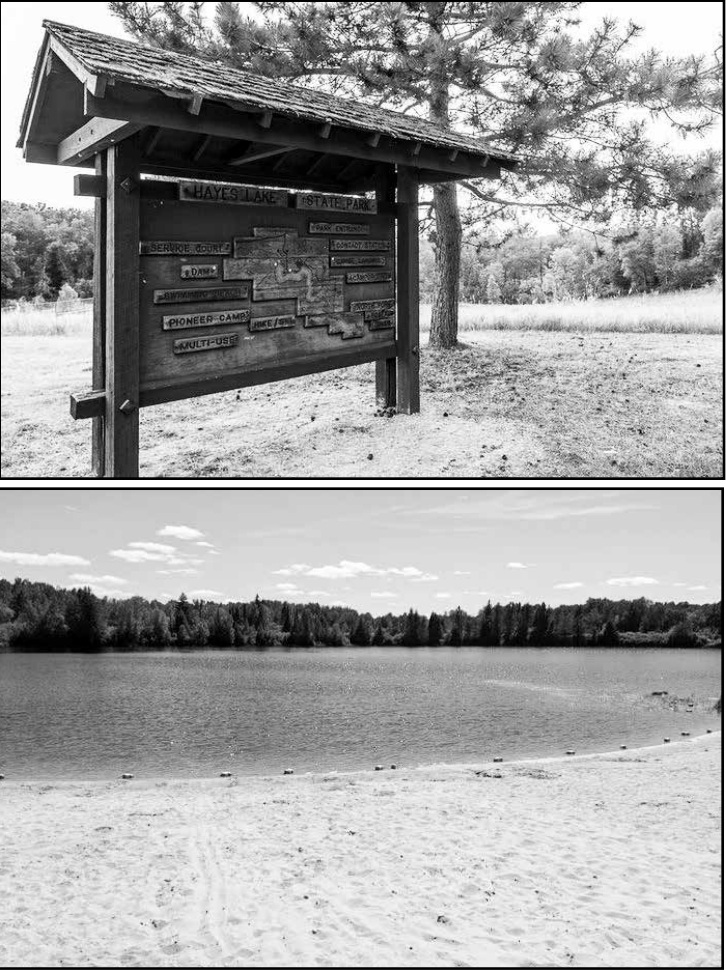
director on the grant writing process.

Schools in our seven-county region can also apply now for an Artist Residency grant of \$2,600 plus an additional \$400 if the residency needs supplies. Our teaching artist roster is a great resource to view artists available to teach in our area and is available on our website at www.NorthwestMinnesotaArtsCouncil.org under the artists tab. Another resource to view artists available to enhance curriculum is COMPAS.

Schools can initially apply for one residency. Then based on remaining funding, can request up to three additional residencies into spring and summer. Funding for residency activities comes from the Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment in Minnesota.

Also available on a first come-first served basis are Quick Turnaround Grants for \$500. These grants are awarded to performing artists, visual artists, media artists, and creative writing artists from our seven county Minnesota service area including Kittson, Marshall, Norman, Pennington, Polk, Red Lake, and Roseau counties.
