Brady Swanson is the new Warroad Museum Manager



Brady Swanson, an alumnus of Grygla High School, is the new manager at the Warroad Museum. The following article ran in the Roseau Times on October 20th, 2023, and was written by Laurel Latham. The Warroad Historical Society held an open house at the museum to welcome and recognize Swanson back in October. Swanson has made his home in Warroad, MN.

Meet the new Warroad Museum Manager Brady Swanson

"We lucked out in recruiting Brady Swanson to move back north from Minneapolis," said Warroad Heritage Center Board member Cyndy Renfrow.

"Look for a lot of fun events to come from the Warroad Heritage Center and Warroad Historical Society in the coming months!"

"What impressed the board members was the fact that Brady had museum experience," explained Warroad Heritage Center Board member Ron Tveit. "Brady has a degree in history from the University of Minnesota Morris and work experience at the Oliver H. Kelley Farm in Elk River. The Oliver H. Kelley Farm is a living history museum farm where we would take our Warroad sixth grade classes on field trips."

Other board members who

took part in the hiring process include Warroad Heritage Center board members Marg Marvin and Bob Evans.

"While I was attending college, I was fortunate to get a two-year internship at the Stevens County Museum," said Brady. "I'm thankful the curator there gave me the opportunity for hands-on experience at collecting, organizing, and documenting artifacts."

Brady recalls the time he spent working at the Oliver H. Kelley Farm in Elk River.

"I worked at the Oliver H. Kelley Farm for three seasons, from the spring of 2019 to the fall of 2021," said Brady. "I was an interpreter there. We dressed and worked as they had in the 1860s. I was a teamster and worked with a team of oxen and two teams of horses. We farmed like they did in the 1860s and had kids and adults joining us in farming."

"The people and the work were so cool, but interpreting to kids was always my favorite," continued Brady. "You don't just give kids answers because kids don't learn that way. A kid will ask 'why does the farm have oxen?'. You ask them questions back and see them work it out. Eventually you will see the lightbulb turn on in their eyes and they excitedly shout out their answer. That was the favorite part of my job!"

Brady Swanson was born in Thief River Falls but spent the first five and a half years of his life in Warroad. "My mom was the manager at the old nursing home and my dad worked at Marvin," said Brady. "My dad was big into history and passed on his love of history to me. Our family moved to Grygla in 2001, where I graduated from

Grygla High School in 2014.

"I was working for Namsa Medical Research when my mom sent me a newspaper clipping about the museum manager position at Warroad Heritage Center. I'm excited to be in Warroad and working in the museum," said Brady.

"I'm presently getting everything in order and setting things up the way I would like to run the museum. I'm immersed in the history of Warroad. There's much to unpack and learn. The Warroad Museum has files on hundreds of families. Everyone is welcome to come in and research their families. A good chunk of what is in the museum is what area residents have collected. Working in a museum means I am constantly learning new things," continued Brady. "I will come across some obscure fact and research it and learn about the bigger meaning."

"Currently our office hours are weekdays, Mon.-Fri. from 1-5 p.m., but we are hoping to expand those hours. If the library is open and I am in the museum working, I have an open door policy. Come in and explore," said Brady. "For those wanting to keep up on future events planned at the museum, it's a good idea to follow the Warroad Heritage Center on Facebook. We will be holding special events. For instance, Trivia Night will soon be returning to Lake of the Woods Brewery."

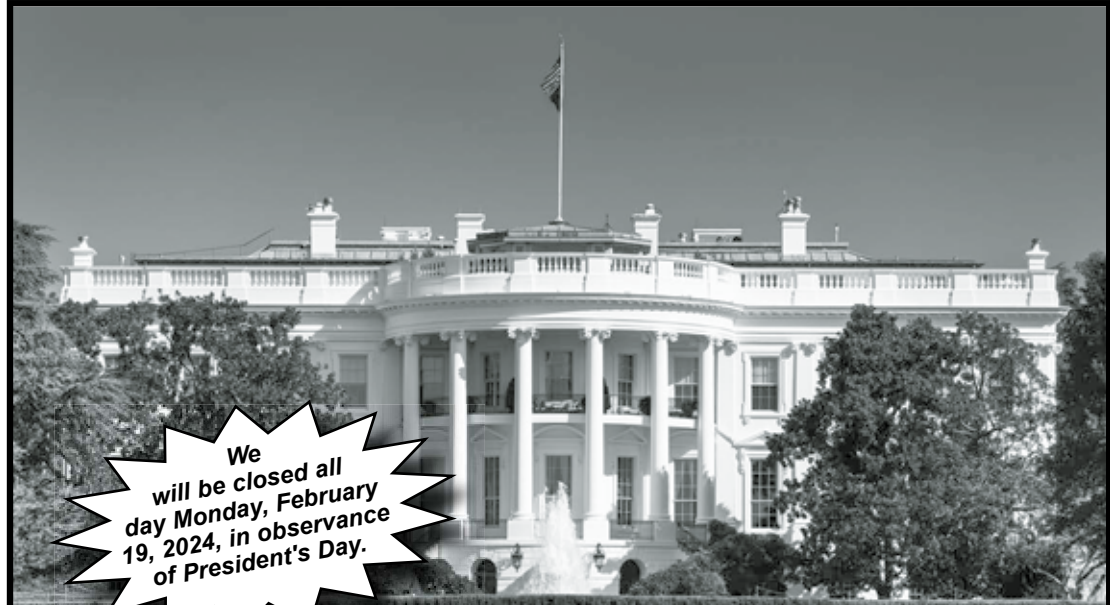

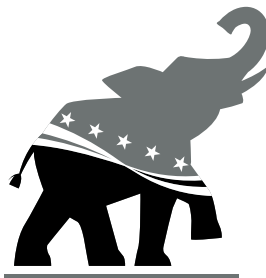

You'll love a trip to Minnesota's longest pier that stretches infinitely into a lake

Let's get happy summer thoughts on our minds this week! Here in the Land of 10,000 Lakes, there are many ways to enjoy the water. You can head out on a motorboat for a speedy trip through the currents, or you can take it slow in a canoe or kayak. You can visit one of the state's many beaches to go for a dip, or you can enjoy the view from the shore. If you're an angler, you have a host of options, too. You can drop in a line from a boat or the shoreline, or you find a nice fishing pier to settle into. Today, we'd like to suggest a great one. The longest fishing pier in Minnesota seems to stretch infinitely into Dower Lake. It's a fantastic place to catch a fish or simply enjoy the view.

The longest pier in Minnesota is found at Dower Lake Recre-

ation Area in Staples, Minnesota.

The recreation area is a lovely spot to spend an afternoon. It's a 54-acre park that has a softball area, a basketball court, and a disc golf course, as well as picnic areas, campsites, and a swimming beach.

But the park's biggest claim to fame is its pier. It's the longest fishing pier in Minnesota! It stretches 612 feet into Dower Lake. This beautiful pier is truly a sight to behold. From the shore, it looks like it goes on forever. At the end of the pier, you'll find a great spot to settle in for a few hours of fishing. Benches will keep you comfy as you cast your line and wait for a bite.

Dower Lake Recreation Area is a little-known spot in central Minnesota. But it's home to that impressive 612-foot fishing pier, the longest pier in Minnesota!



Strategic Farming: Let's talk crops! Session talks about making herbicides work better

On February 7, Dr. Tommy Butts, Extension Weed Scientist with the University of Arkansas, and Tom Hoverstad, Researcher at the University of Minnesota Southern Research and Outreach Center in Waseca, joined UMN Extension Educator-Crops Ryan Miller for a discussion on "Making herbicides work better". Specifically, this session focused on making choices and adjustments to ensure a successful herbicide application.

Of the many pieces that can affect weed control, nozzle selection is critically important as this can drastically influence spray coverage. Nozzles affect droplet size, which is the key factor influencing coverage, but if regulations or drift concerns mandate use of a larger droplet size, you will likely need to increase the gallon per acre (GPA) rate to get the coverage needed.

With a contact herbicide like glufosinate (a.i. in Liberty), droplet size is even more important than spray volume, although both are key in achieving acceptable control. For example, nozzles that produce large droplet sizes are NOT recommended when applying glufosinate due to the droplet size being too large to achieve the needed level of coverage. With systemic herbicides like dicamba or glyphosate (a.i. in Roundup), droplet size has less of an effect, but even here, if droplet size is too big and spray volume is too low, you will not have the coverage needed and control can be reduced.

Time of day, temperature and humidity at the time of application, adjuvants and tank-mix partners can also affect herbicide effectiveness. For example, it is recommended to apply glufosinate during the day, from around 8 or 9 a.m. to no later than 5 p.m. Ammonium sulfate should be added to the tank when applying glufosinate to enhance control. Targeting weeds before they exceed 3 to 4 inches in height is important with herbicide-resistant weeds. These practices include strategies like increasing crop canopy development, narrow rows, earlier planting dates, cover crops, strategic tillage, cultivation, cleaning equipment, harvest weed seed control and more.

Finally, make sure you read the label. Herbicide labels provide valuable advice on making effective herbicide applications to give you the best chance of success.

SIMPLY DELICIOUS

Bruschetta Chicken

Bruschetta levels up from appetizer territory in this supertime spin on a classic. Grilled (or baked, your choice) chicken plays host to diced tomatoes, basil and a tangy balsamic glaze in this quick and easy main dish conversion. Pay homage to summer and go as fresh as possible with your produce for the best flavor in Bruschetta Chicken!

Ingredients

- 4 6-oz boneless skinless chicken breasts
- 2 tsp italian seasoning
- 1 tsp kosher salt
- 1 tsp onion powder
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 tsp ground pepper
- 1-2 tbsp olive oil

Bruschetta

- 3-4 medium ripe tomatoes (about 1 lb) cored, seeded, and chopped to a ½" dice
- 1 tsp kosher salt
- 2 cloves garlic minced
- 1 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- 2 tsp balsamic vinegar
- 2 tbsp thinly sliced basil leaves

ground pepper to taste
balsamic glaze to taste, optional

Instructions

Start the bruschetta. Combine the chopped tomatoes with salt and garlic in a mixing bowl; mix until well combined, then let sit while the chicken cooks.

Prepare the chicken. Place one chicken breast onto a sheet of parchment paper. Fold the paper over the chicken. Using a rolling pin, pound the chicken breast to even thickness of a little less than 1". Set aside and repeat with the remaining chicken breasts.

Combine the italian seasoning, salt, garlic powder, onion powder, and pepper in a small bowl. Stir to combine.

Brush the chicken with olive oil, then sprinkle with the seasoning blend. Flip the chicken oven, then oil and season the other side.

To Grill: heat a grill or grill pan over high heat. Place the chicken breasts directly on the grill grates and cook 5-6 minutes per side, or until the internal temperature reads 165°F using an instant read thermometer. Remove from the grill and rest 5 minutes.

To Bake: heat the oven to 400°F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. Roast the chicken for 10-12 minutes. Remove from the oven and rest five minutes.

Finish the bruschetta topping. Stir in the olive oil, balsamic vinegar, fresh basil, and ground pepper to taste. Taste for seasoning and adjust with salt, pepper, or vinegar to taste.

Top the grilled chicken with the bruschetta. Serve immediately.

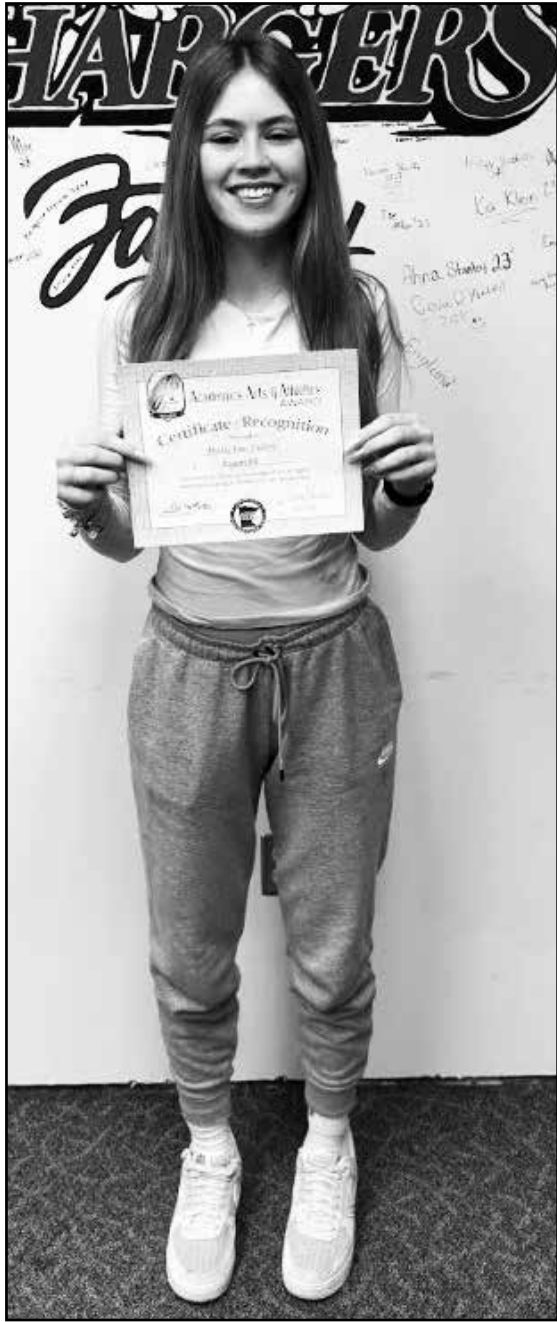
