The regular meeting on October 14th was called to order at 7pm at the Civic Building by Mayor Devin Ruud with the following council members present: Gavin Nordby, Dave Dunrud, Dustin Nelson and Karla Byklum. Absent: None. Also present were Rocky Hagen and

Rose Aune.
Council approved minutes, along with receipts, disbursements, checking, savings & total balances for that month. The payment of all bills was also approved. Other items included:
AIRPORT RUNWAY
Todd suggests getting an engineer out to look at the runway and figure out if the City can do an upgrade. In the spring, they'll need to get a topsoil on and do the taxiway and first 300' going south.
TRANSFER STRUCTURE MICROLOAN

Ken Hendrickson moved up to Grygla 5 years ago from the Twin Cities. He is the son of Ray Hendrickson and brother of Julie Grossman, residents of the rural Fourn town area. Ken served in the Navy for seven years as a Special Weapons Tech., then spent four years in the reserves. He re-enlisted after 9/11 and volunteered to go to Iraq. Ken's Humvee was hit by a projectile, and he was thrown 65 feet from the vehicle. He suffered broken vertebrae in his back, a broken tibia and fibula, split his pelvis in two places, fractured both feet and sheared off part of his left femur.
Ken was able to go on a hunting excursion recently through Minnesota Outdoor Foundation where he shot this 10-point buck out of Baldhill Creek Adventures in North Dakota. Thank you to Ken for his service to our country and congrats on that big buck.

Pillsbury Biscuit Garlic Butter Cheese Bombs

Ingredients:
1 container of refrigerated biscuit dough (8 biscuits)
4 mozzarella string cheese (cut into 8)
4 tbsp melted butter (half a stick)
1 tsp garlic powder
1 tsp Italian seasoning

Directions:
Preheat your oven to 375°F.

Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or lightly grease it. Open the container of refrigerated biscuit dough and separate the biscuits into 8. Flatten each one and add ½ a cheese stick. Fold the edges of the dough up and around the cheese, pinching to seal and form a ball.

Place the cheese-filled biscuit bombs seam-side down on the prepared baking sheet.

In a small bowl, combine the melted butter, garlic powder and Italian seasoning. Brush the tops of the biscuit bombs with the seasoned butter mixture.

Bake in the preheated oven for 12-15 minutes, or until the biscuit bombs are golden brown and the cheese is melted and gooey.

Serve the garlic butter cheese bombs warm. Enjoy them on their own or with a dipping sauce of your choice.



Minnesota Winter Hazard Awareness Week

Minnesota's Emergency Managers are joining the National Weather Service and Minnesota Homeland Security and Emergency Management to promote Minnesota Winter Hazard Awareness Week November 18-22, 2024. Beltrami County Emergency Management and Public Health Emergency Preparedness join this effort to ensure our neighbors are prepared for the inevitable return of winter. As in previous years, each day of the week will have a hazard topic to focus on.

Monday's topic is Winter Weather Overview. Minnesota experiences a wide range of adverse weather during the winter months ranging from blizzards, heavy snowfall, extreme cold and ice storms. Blizzards are severe winter storms with blinding snow, cold temperatures and strong winds. Winter storms can produce heavy snow and ice accumulations, making travel difficult or impossible and knock out power. Temperatures can fall well below zero in Minnesota. It is important to check the forecast and plan ahead.

Tuesday's topic is Outdoor Winter Safety. Northern Minnesota is well-known for recreation activities in the winter.

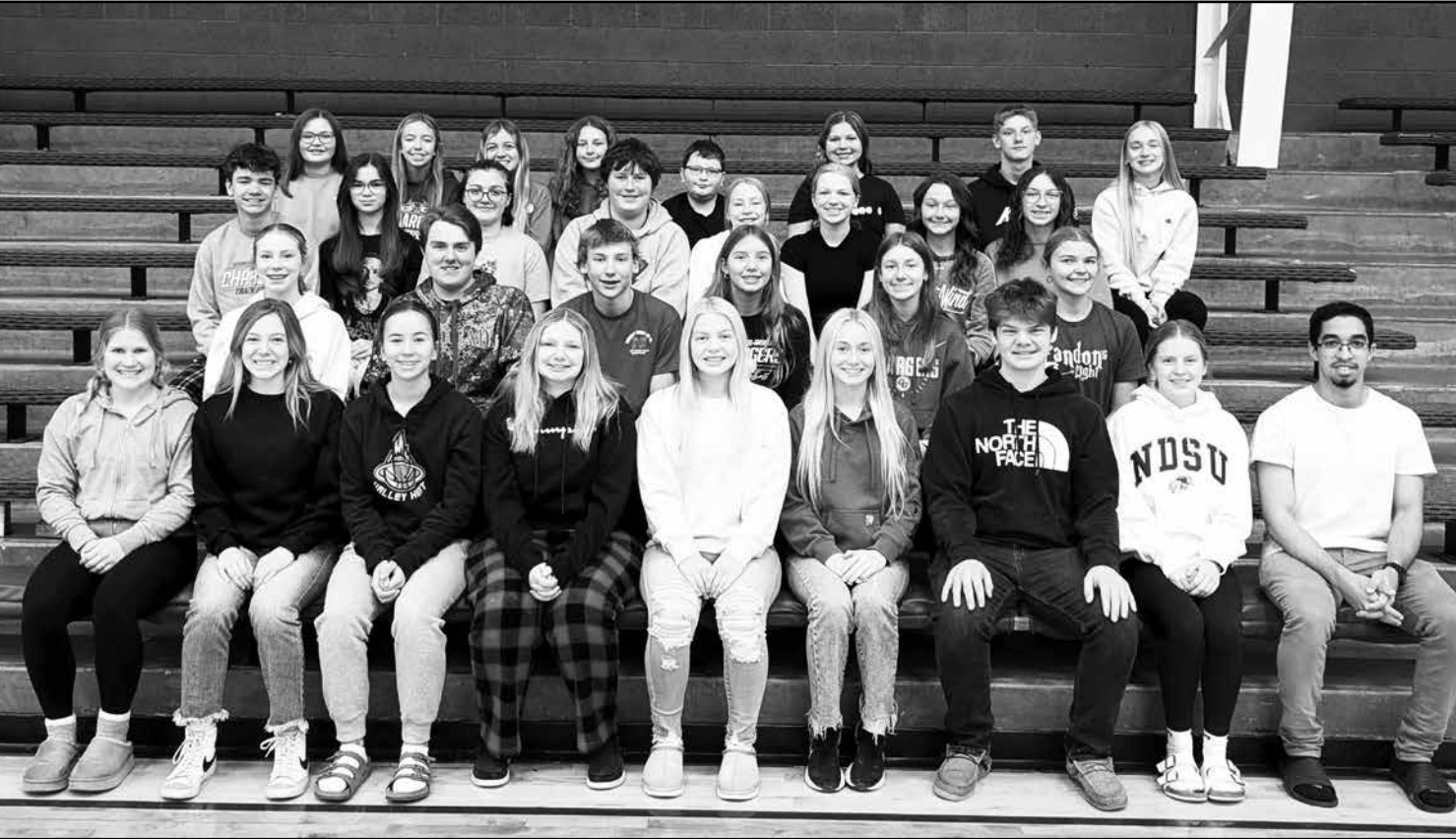
Whether you enjoy snowmobiling, skiing, skating, ice fishing or just being outdoors, these activities can also be dangerous. Check ice conditions before venturing on bodies of water, inquire with area resorts as they frequently have reports. A minimum of four inches of clear ice is recommended for walking and at least thirteen inches for a smaller truck. Don't operate snowmobiles intoxicated. Dress accordingly, during extreme cold, hypothermia can set in quickly.

Wednesday's topic is Winter Fire Safety. Each winter season there is a noticeable increase in home fires. There are several contributing factors why there is an increase in home fires, primarily because people are indoors more, participate in holiday traditions and efforts to keep homes warm. cold out and the warm in, it increases the chances of poisonous gas exposures and mold. Equip your home with carbon monoxide detectors. It is a good time to also check your smoke detectors. Radon is a colorless gas that comes from the soil and can also be trapped in your home. Radon gas decays into fine particles that are radioactive. Radon tests are available and can be reduced with mitigation systems.

Friday's topic is Winter Driving. Traveling in adverse winter conditions can be hazardous and dangerous. Plan before you travel to reduce your risk by checking road conditions through 511mn.org and let people know your travel itinerary. Make sure you have a winter survival kit and a phone with a charger. Have your vehicle serviced and have appropriate tires. Snowplows are big with flashing lights for a reason, they're heavy and need room to work. Give plows at least ten car lengths of room to work.
