Permit to Carry class

Nordvick Arms, LLC, will be holding a Permit to Carry class on Sunday, January 19th, at the Wannaska Community Center at 1pm. This class is for renewals and first time permits. The cost is \$70. You need to be at least 20 years old and able to possess firearms legally. You can't apply at the sheriff's department for your permit until you turn 21.

This class is approved by the MN Bureau of Criminal Apprehension and is taught by instructor Luke Nordvick. He uses a variety of resources from organizations that he has been certified in, including NRA, USCCA, Rangemaster, Law of Self Defense and more.

The class will cover Safety, Use of Force Principals, Scenario Training, State Laws and much more. It is about 4 hours long. There will be range time. Hearing and eye protection will be provided at no extra cost. Other range equipment can be rented for a small fee. Winter fun in TRF
There are a lot of fun things to do around the area this winter, including some upcoming winter fun in TRF: Frost Fest Fat Bike Ride on January 25th, snowshoe through picturesque trails, glide along pristine cross-country ski paths or ice skate on one of the 4 rinks in town. There's something for everyone, no matter your fitness level. Get ready to have some serious winter fun.

The highlight of the month is Frost Fest, taking place in TRF on January 24-26. Celebrate winter in style with events like the Frost Fest Parade, Chamber's January Jubilee at the Legacy Event Center, and family-friendly fun like snow golf at the golf course, fat tire bike rides and a hot dish/soup cookoff. Don't miss live entertainment, including Hairball at The Ralph Engstad Arena and a comedian at the Legacy Event Center. Plus, enjoy all-weekend activities like lighted cross-country skiing, fire pits and ice sculptures around town.

Walk, snowshoe or ski by candlelight at a State Park near you

Each winter, candlelight events at Minnesota state parks, recreation areas and trails encourage people to get outdoors and warm up to winter. The events feature trails lit up at night with candles, lanterns and other luminaries. Depending on the location of the event and the amount of snow cover, visitors can hike, snowshoe or cross-country ski along the lighted trails.

"Winter candlelight events are a magical way to experience Minnesota's state parks, recreation areas and trails," said Ann Pierce, director of Parks and Trails Division at the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. "There's something truly special about walking a snowy trail under the glow of candlelight, where the quiet of the night and the sparkle of the snow create a peaceful escape. It's a chance to slow down, connect with nature, spend time with friends and family and find beauty in the stillness of winter."

This winter, 19 candlelight events at 17 different locations are planned between Jan. 3 and Feb. 22. The schedule — including dates, times and other details — is available at the candlelight events webpage (mndnr.gov/candlelight).

Candlelight trails are suitable for beginners of all ages. In some locations, snowshoes and skis can be rented or checked out at the ranger station or visitor center. Call the park in advance to confirm the availability of equipment.

In the event of severe weather, check alerts and notices on the park website or call the park office. Park websites are listed on the DNR website (mndnr.gov/parklist) and phone numbers are listed on each park website.

Save time: Get vehicle permits online before event. While there is no participation fee for the candlelight events, a vehicle permit is required to enter Minnesota state parks and recreation areas. The DNR recommends buying permits in advance at the state park vehicle permit website (mndnr.gov/permit). The cost is \$7 per day, or \$35 for a year.

The closest events near Grygla happen at Itasca State

Park and Lake Bemidji State Park with an event at Itasca this weekend, Saturday, January 11th, at Itasca State Park, from 5-7:30pm.

Location: Jacob V. Brower Visitor Center. Open 9 AM to 8 PM.

Please join us for the annual Lantern Light Event at Itasca State Park! Bundle up to walk, snowshoe, or ski at your leisure as the glow of candlelight guides your way through towering pines. Total trail length out-and-back is 3.5 miles following the South Entrance Road. It is a well-defined path with minimal elevation change. Adjust the distance to suit your fitness level. There will be a campfire crackling at the trailhead to warm-up or roast your favorite campfire snack. Gather inside the Jacob V. Brower Visitor Center for refreshments and music by local folk/alternative singer, Lori Reich.

NEW IN 2025: Light supper served fresh from the Mary Gibbs pop-up Cafe located in the visitor center classroom (cash sales only, ATM available).

If snow conditions allow, ski and snowshoe rentals will be available from the Itasca Sports winter rental shop at the Forest Inn. Adult and youth sizes are available.

A Minnesota state parks vehicle permit is required on all vehicles in the park. A Minnesota Ski Pass is required for all skiers over 16 years old. Purchase permits and passes at the Jacob V. Brower Visitor Center when you arrive or purchase them online in advance. Pets are not allowed on groomed ski trails or inside park buildings.

Itasca State Park offers winter camping and lodging! Stay for the weekend...there is plenty more to explore!

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Fatal weekend crash

Around the area
Update on fatal weekend crash near Red Lake Falls, MN, provided by Mitch Bernstein, Red Lake County Sheriff: On the afternoon of 01/04/25, Wyatt James Sauve (25) of Red Lake Falls died in a single-vehicle crash in Louisville Township. Mr. Sauve was driving a 2018 Chevy Malibu, eastbound on CR. #13, approximately ½ mile west of its intersection with CR. #9, approximately 6 miles northwest of Red Lake Falls.

The vehicle left the roadway, entered the south ditch and rolled several times. A Red Lake County Deputy, the Red Lake Falls Ambulance, the Red Lake Falls Fire Department and Minnesota State Patrol responded to the scene.

Mr. Sauve was ejected from the vehicle, and he was pronounced dead at the scene. The vehicle was totally damaged and was towed from the scene. The Minnesota State Patrol is assisting with the crash investigation which remains ongoing.

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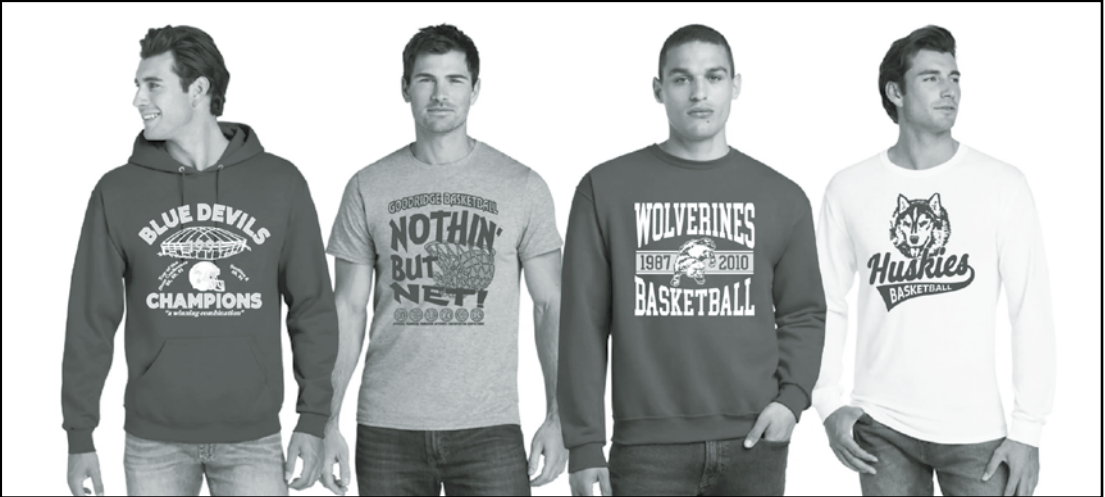

Only in Minnesota: a weekly feature in the Eagle

This Upper Midwest road trip will take you to some of the most significant settings in Laura Ingalls Wilder's 'Little House' books

We have an incredible literary tradition here in the Land of 10,000 Lakes. Influential authors like F. Scott Fitzgerald, Louise Erdrich, and Marlon James all hail from, live, or have lived here. Native sons Sinclair Lewis of Sauk Centre and Bob Dylan of Hibbing have won Nobel Prizes for literature. But I believe the Minnesota writer who has had the widest influence and broadest appeal is, arguably, Laura Ingalls Wilder. Her "Little House" books about growing up in the Upper Midwest have sold more than 60 million copies and gave rise to the long-running television series Little House on the Prairie and its spinoffs. Since I live in the heart of Little House country, I thought it would be fun to put together an Upper Midwest road trip to visit some significant spots in the origin story of Laura Ingalls Wilder.

The driving time for the road trip comes in at less than six hours, but you're going to want to take your time and soak in these sites. I'd recommend at least a weekend, but three days would be better. No matter how you break it up, though, you can start the route from your location and navigate by tapping or clicking on the interactive map above.

1. Laura Ingalls Wilder Birthplace - Stockholm, Wisconsin

Laura Ingalls was born in 1867, at a cabin in Pepin County, Wisconsin - a cabin she would later refer to as the Little House in the Big Woods in the book of the same name. The Laura Ingalls Wilder Museum in Pepin acquired three acres of the Ingalls' original property - outside of present-day Stockholm, Wisconsin - and created a wayside with a replica of the cabin, using descriptions in the book to guide its construction.

This was the first stop on my

road trip, and it also marks the official beginning of the Laura Ingalls Wilder Historic Highway. I'm fascinated by Wilder's connections to the places where I've lived and grown up - Minnesota, Iowa, and Wisconsin - but I'm not as diehard a fan as many, who take a keener interest in the minutiae of her life. So, for me, this little cabin where she was born was my favorite site of the trip. The cabin is open year-round, although the wayside is not maintained in the winter.

2. Laura Ingalls Wilder Museum - Pepin, Wisconsin

Next, I traveled a few minutes into Pepin proper, where the Laura Ingalls Wilder Museum, itself, is located. The Ingalls family lived in the Pepin area from 1863 to 1869, left briefly to live in the Kansas territory, but returned to the little house in the Big Woods in 1871. They remained there until 1874, when Laura was seven years old, at which time they moved to an acreage near Walnut Grove, Minnesota.

The seasonal museum in Pepin has a ton of information about this period in Wilder's life. It was closed on my recent visit, but I've been before, and I highly recommend it. It's a mecca for Wilder fans, and a good stop for those with even a passing interest. If you go in September, you can celebrate Laura Ingalls Wilder Days, a weekend-long nod to the author.

3. Laura Ingalls Wilder Park and Museum - Burr Oak, Iowa

My next two stops were out of chronological order in the timeline of Laura Ingalls Wilder, but for road tripping purposes, they were more efficient. From Pepin, I made my way down the Mississippi River valley, then cut across southeastern Minnesota, before dipping about five miles south of the border to Burr Oak, Iowa - one of only a couple Ingalls Wilder literary sites in Iowa.

The Ingalls' tenure in Burr Oak was a bit of an anomaly in the family's timeline. After

several years of crop failure, Charles ("Pa") Ingalls agreed to help friends manage the Masters Hotel in the tiny community. The family left Walnut Grove for Burr Oak in 1876, but by 1878, the family had returned to Walnut Grove. Ingalls Wilder didn't include this period in the Little House books, so it's often referred to as the Ingalls' "lost year." The Masters Hotel, which is open seasonally May through October, has the distinction of being the only Ingalls Wilder home still located on its original site. Visit in June for Burr Oak's annual "Laura Days" celebration.

This is also a good place to break up the road trip. You may want to consider, as I did, heading 15 minutes south of Burr Oak to the charming town of Decorah, Iowa, where you can grab a casual dinner at the pizza joint, Mabe's, and spend the night at the historic Hotel Winneshiek.

4. Laura Ingalls Wilder Site - Spring Valley, Minnesota

Departing even farther from the chronology of Laura Ingalls Wilder's travels, the next stop on my road trip was Spring Valley, Minnesota, located about 45 northwest of Burr Oak. Although it's possible that Laura and the Ingalls family may have passed through Spring Valley on their journeys across Minnesota, the significance of the town in Laura lore is that the family of her future husband, Almanzo Wilder, lived there.

Laura married Almanzo in De Smet, South Dakota, in 1885. In 1888, the couple contracted diphtheria, and Almanzo was subsequently hobbled by a stroke. In 1890, they traveled to Spring Valley and stayed with Almanzo's parents for about a year so he could recuperate. A Methodist church houses a small museum dedicated to the Wilders, and a few other relevant sites are still in the area, including a historic home in town and a barn in the country.

5. Sod House on the Prai-

rie - Sanborn, Minnesota

After leaving Pepin in 1874, the Ingalls' moved to an acreage near Walnut Grove, Minnesota. I, on the other hand, made my way toward Walnut Grove from Spring Valley. Upon arriving in Walnut Grove, the Ingalls lived in a dugout house that was walled with sod, as chronicled in Wilder's *On the Banks of Plum Creek*.

Although you can visit the original site, the Ingalls' dugout has been washed away by time. But, on your way to Walnut Grove, you can stop by Sod House on the Prairie, just east of town, and see for yourself what sod house life was like. The site is closed during winter months.

6. Laura Ingalls Wilder Museum - Walnut Grove, Minnesota

The crown jewel of the Laura Ingalls Wilder sites in Minnesota is, of course, Walnut Grove, where the Laura Ingalls Wilder Museum and other ancillary Wilder sites and events can be found. These include the Ingalls dugout site on the literal banks of Plum Creek, as well as the annual Wilder Pageant, which takes place every summer and re-enacts scenes with characters from *On the Banks of Plum Creek*. It's an Ingalls-palooza. As much as I love the birthplace cabin in Pepin, Walnut Grove - pretty obviously - is the one site in Minnesota, Wisconsin, or Iowa that no Laura Ingalls Wilder fan should miss.

While this road trip is far from complete, it covers the greatest concentration of Laura Ingalls Wilder sites in the country. They start to spread out quite a bit after Walnut Grove. If you have time, you could tack De Smet, South Dakota - the Ingalls' next move - onto the end of this road trip. It's two hours west of Walnut Grove and, arguably, the most important of the settings in the Little House books. Those who grew up on the television series, as I did, will be more familiar with Walnut Grove, Minnesota.

is available in rural communities of generally 35,000 people or less.

The maximum loan amount is \$40,000 at a one percent interest rate, repayable for a 20-year term and can be used to improve or modernize homes and do essential repairs. Grants of up to \$10,000 are available to homeowners 62 and older and must be used to remove health or safety hazards, such as fix-

ing a leaking roof, installing indoor plumbing, or replacing a furnace.

French Onion Baked Potatoes

Baked potatoes are stuffed with caramelized onions, butter, and sour cream in this cheesy take on a loaded baked potato.

Ingredients

- 4 large russet potatoes, scrubbed and patted dry
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt, plus more to taste
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper, plus more for garnish
- 1/4 cup salted butter, softened
- 1/4 cup sour cream
- Frenched Onions, warmed (recipes can be easily found online for this)
- 4 ounces Gruyère cheese, shredded (about 1 cup)
- Thyme leaves, for garnish

Directions

Preheat oven to 400°F. Prick each potato all over, using a fork. Rub potatoes evenly with oil and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place potatoes directly on oven rack and place a sheet of aluminum foil on lower rack to catch any drips. Roast until a paring knife inserted into pota-

toes meets no resistance, about 1 hour. Remove potatoes from oven and transfer to a small rimmed baking sheet lined with foil; let cool 5 minutes.

Cut a lengthwise slit down center of each potato about three-fourths of the way through; squeeze sides to open potato. Season inside of potato to taste with additional salt, and top with evenly divided butter, sour cream, Frenched onions, and Gruyère.

Preheat broiler with oven rack about 5 inches from heat source. Broil potatoes until Gruyère is melted and just starting to brown, 1 to 3 minutes. Garnish with thyme leaves and additional black pepper. Serve hot.
