Grace Lutheran’s youth programs keep kids learning, serving & having fun

Grace Lutheran Church’s popular Faith, Food & Family (FFF) program recently wrapped up another fun and faith-filled season with their spring program on Wednesday, March 26.

FFF, which stands for Faith, Food & Family Night, has been a Wednesday afternoon and evening tradition at Grace Lutheran since last October. This year’s spring program drew a crowd of about 130 parents, grandparents and congregation members. Students shared scripture readings from the Easter story and performed a music medley for family and friends.

Each week during the FFF season, students gathered for an afternoon packed with activity, learning and plenty of fun. Kids rotated through four 20-minute blocks that included a biblical lesson, arts & crafts, games and activities, and a quiet homework time. Afterward, everyone gathered together in the church to sing praise songs — a favorite part of the evening — before ending the night with supper and socializing.

The program was led by a dedicated team of teachers and helpers: Tausha Severts, Amy Holte, Gretchen Smeby, Wayne Thomas, Tiffany Anderson and Ruth Anderson. Supper was prepared each week by Hazel Thomas and Melinda Sax.

Teacher Ruth Anderson shared that the program continues to thrive since its start a few years ago. “Faith, Food & Family has been very successful since its beginning at Grace Lutheran Church,” she said. “Each week, we average about 30-40 students. What’s so wonderful about this program is that it’s an ecumenical group. It has taken the place of the Sunday School program at

Grace, but it’s also opened the doors to kids from all faith backgrounds. It’s reaching our youth in ways that might not have happened just by attending church. Students are hearing good and positive things in a world that doesn’t always come across in that way.”

In addition to FFF, Grace Lutheran also has an active LYO (Lutheran Youth Organization) group that’s been busy this spring. On Saturday, April 5, the LYO group took a field trip to Bemidji where they visited the Evergreen Youth & Family Service Center. During their visit, students delivered 11 quilts made by the Grace WELCA quilting ladies, along with a \$650 donation from the LYO’s Souper Bowl Sunday collection. The funds were designated to help the center continue its services for youth and families in need.

While at Evergreen, the group toured the facility and learned about the valuable resources the center provides to young people and families who seek help there.

Of course, the field trip also included some good old-fashioned fun - the LYO group went bowling afterward and shared a pizza meal together.

To round out their busy weekend, the LYO kids were also on hand at the Firemen’s Supper on Sunday, April 6, where they served up delicious ice cream sundaes for event-goers.

As another season of Faith, Food & Family Night comes to a close, it’s clear that Grace Lutheran Church continues to live out its mission of faith, service and community connection...with plenty of food and fun along the way!



Olson achieves Doctorate, becomes Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist

A 2011 graduate of Grygla High School, Dillon Olson has reached an exciting milestone in his medical career — earning his Doctorate in Nursing Practice (DNP) and becoming a Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist (CRNA).

Following high school, Olson attended the University of North Dakota, where he balanced both academics and athletics, playing football while earning a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree in 2016.

After college, Olson began his nursing career working in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) at Gundersen Health System in La Crosse, Wisconsin, before transitioning to the ICU at CentraCare Health System – St. Cloud Hospital. During this time, he also pursued additional coursework in physics, chemistry and statistics in preparation for anesthesia school, while earning certifications in critical care, trauma care and advanced life support.

In 2021, Olson was accepted into the Minneapolis School of Anesthesia. The intensive 39-month program included extensive classroom instruction along with over 3,000 clinical hours at several well-known hospitals, including United Hospital in St. Paul, Fairview Southdale in Edina, HCMC in Minneapolis, St. Cloud Hospital and Masonic Children’s Hospital in Minneapolis.

In March 2025, Olson officially earned his CRNA certification and completed his doctorate degree. He will begin his new role as a CRNA at St. Cloud Hospital in May.

Reflecting on his journey, Olson shared, “It’s been a long road with a lot of hard work, but I’m incredibly thankful for the experiences and the people who have supported me along the way. I’m excited to begin this next chapter.”

Olson currently lives in St. Michael, Minnesota, with his wife, Cassandra, their son, Bennett, his younger cousin, Tyler Olson, and their golden retriever, Herb.

Only in Minnesota: a weekly feature in the Eagle

Two Minnesota State Parks removed from the System in 2024: What happened and what comes next?

In 2024, two Minnesota state parks were officially removed from the system following legislative decisions that led to their closure. Upper Sioux Agency State Park was returned to the Upper Sioux Community, while Hill Annex Mine State Park was abolished and reopened for mining operations. These changes reduced the number of state parks in Minnesota from 66 to 64, prompting discussions about the impact on recreation and the future of public lands in the state.

The return of Upper Sioux Agency State Park

Upper Sioux Agency State Park, a 1,280-acre site established in 1963, was officially closed on February 16, 2024, as part of an agreement between the state and the Upper Sioux Community. The decision followed decades of advocacy by the Dakota people, who had long sought the return of the land due to its historical and cultural significance. The park occupied a site central to the U.S.-Dakota War of 1862, a conflict that arose when the U.S. government failed to uphold treaty obligations, leading

to widespread suffering among the Dakota people.

In 2023, the Minnesota Legislature approved the land transfer, recognizing the long-standing efforts of the Upper Sioux Community to reclaim the site. At the official ceremony marking the return, Minnesota Governor Tim Walz emphasized that the decision was about correcting historical wrongs. Upper Sioux Community Tribal Chairman Kevin Jensvold echoed the sentiment, highlighting the significance of the return for his people.

While the closure of the park created a recreational gap in the Upper Minnesota River Valley, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has committed to exploring new recreational opportunities in the region. DNR Commissioner Sarah Strommen acknowledged the need to provide alternative outdoor spaces for visitors who previously enjoyed the park.

The closure of Hill Annex Mine State Park

Unlike Upper Sioux Agency, the closure of Hill Annex Mine State Park was unexpected and met with little public discussion before it occurred. In February 2024, a proposal was introduced in the Minnesota Legislature to eliminate the

park and reopen the site for iron ore mining. The bill was signed into law by Governor Walz on May 21, 2024, and the park was closed just weeks later in mid-June.

Hill Annex Mine State Park, established in 1988, was originally a 625-acre site dedicated to preserving Minnesota's mining history and showcasing the natural restoration of a former open-pit mine. The abrupt decision to revert the park to an active mining site surprised many, particularly given that the area had been recognized as a National Historic Site since 1986. The DNR stated that reopening the mine was "consistent with the historical expectation that mining would return to this site," although this expectation had not been widely communicated to the public.

The park was known not only for its industrial history but also for its ecological recovery, with diverse wildlife returning to the area over the decades. The site's significance as a fossil-rich area was another factor that had made it an important destination. With the resumption of mining, much of this environmental progress will be lost.

The legislation that abolished the park included a pro-

vision for an advisory group to determine potential future uses for the site once mining operations conclude. However, there is no clear timeline for when this process will begin.

Future recreation opportunities

The removal of these two parks has raised concerns about access to outdoor recreation in Minnesota. The DNR is actively assessing new options for recreation in the Minnesota River Valley to compensate for the loss of Upper Sioux Agency State Park. Meanwhile, other state parks, such as Schoolcraft and McCarthy Beach, remain available within a reasonable distance of the former Hill Annex Mine site.

While the state continues to offer 64 parks and nine state recreation areas, the closures highlight the shifting priorities in land management. One site was returned to its original caretakers, preserving its cultural significance, while another was reclaimed for extractive industry. As discussions continue about future recreational opportunities, many outdoor enthusiasts hope that new parks will be established to fill the gaps left behind.

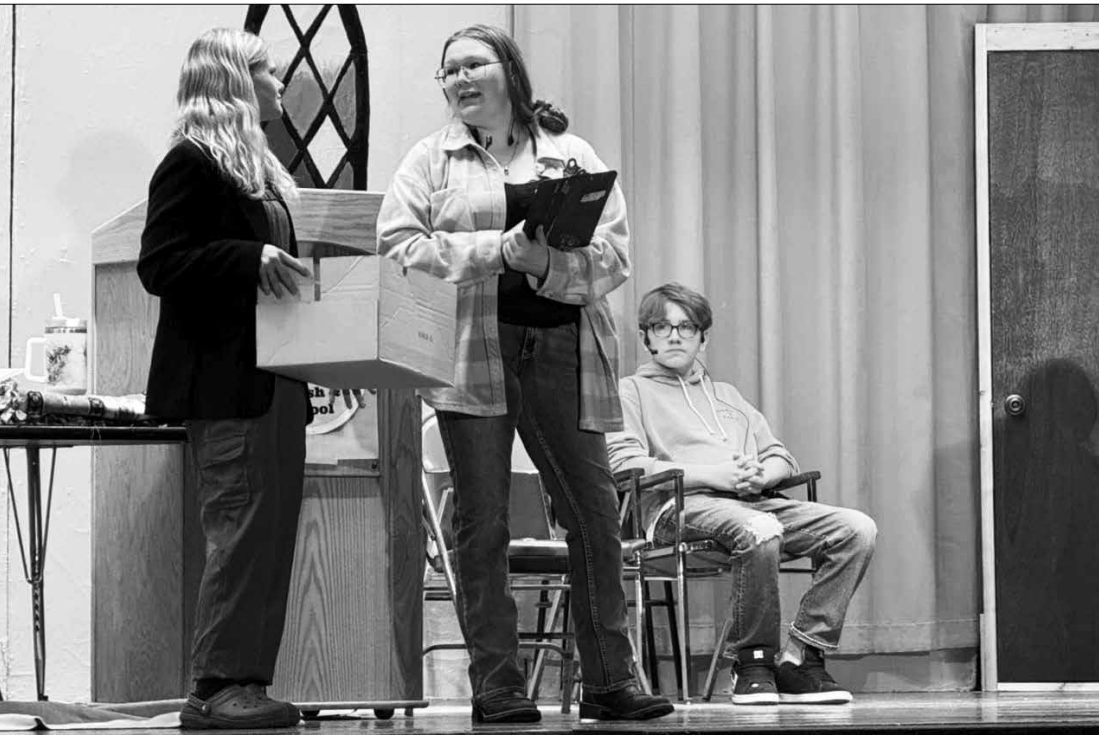
The night wrapped up with
