Gunshot concerns under investigation

There's been some chatter around town after reports of gunshots near Motel 89 last week. The incident, which is still under investigation, happened late Tuesday night, April 8th, and has left a few folks in Grygla feeling uneasy.

Misty Erickson, owner of Motel 89, said she heard a series of rapid gunshots around 10:30–10:45 p.m. The sound was so intense, she said she dropped to the floor, not knowing what was going on outside. A few guests were staying at the motel that night and also heard the shots — one was so shaken they ended up checking out.

The Marshall County Sheriff's Office responded to the report. Erickson said she went to check things over afterwards and found what appeared to be bullet holes on a nearby shed. After the officers inspected the shed, they noted the holes appeared weathered and likely had been there for a while. There were also several vehicles parked nearby that, according to the officers, would've been hit if the shots were recent.

Still, Erickson feels strongly that the holes weren't there this

past fall. "I can state that for a fact — 100% fact," she said. "I had stored a bunch of stuff in that shed for the winter and those holes would've been seen at that time last fall, as they are VERY noticeable." She also wanted to clear up the idea that the shooting was just near the motel. "The shooting was not only on the east end of town," Erickson said. "The same rapid shots were fired around the west end of town as well, per a resident who lives on that side of Grygla. It wasn't solely near the motel."

Erickson chose to speak up not just to defend her business, but also to help people understand that this isn't typical for Grygla. "I chose to come forward because regardless of the area, it is absolutely not a normal thing in or for this community," she said. "Grygla is a small, tucked-away, safe community — and it still is."

Officer Ben Kucera, who was on the scene, added: "If anyone has any information regarding this incident, please give the Marshall County Sheriff's Office a call." The investigation is ongoing, and residents are encouraged to share anything they might have seen or heard that night.

Bear hunt lottery applications available

Prospective bear hunters have until Friday, May 2, to apply for a bear hunting license from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. Applications for the 2025 season can be submitted online, at any license agent or by telephone at 888-665-4236.

A total of 4,605 licenses are available across the 15 quota areas where licenses are limited for the 2025 season, which opens Monday, Sept. 1, and closes Sunday, Oct. 12.

The number of licenses available each year in the quota area is based on Minnesota's bear population trends for those areas. License quotas for the 2025 bear season include a moderate increase where population trends indicate sufficient growth.

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources adopted changes to several bear permit area boundaries for the 2025 bear season. These changes affect areas that had previously been part of permit areas 12, 25, 46 and 451. Area 451 was dissolved and is now included in the no quota area. Boundaries for permit areas 12 and 46 have changed, with former portions of those two permit areas now included in the no quota area.

There also was a change that moves the Trout Lake unit of the Boundary Waters Ca-

noe Area Wilderness from permit area 25 to 22, and permit area 22 is now consistent with the entire BWCAW boundary. Changes to these areas are reflected in the Minnesota bear permit areas map available on the DNR website.

Lottery winners will be notified by Sunday, June 1. The deadline to purchase bear hunting licenses awarded by lottery is Friday, Aug. 1. Any remaining unpurchased licenses will be available over the counter starting at noon on Wednesday, Aug. 6.

An unlimited number of bear licenses will be sold over the counter for the no-quota area that includes east-central and far northwest Minnesota. No-quota licenses are valid only in the no-quota area.

Hunters with either a quota or no-quota license who are interested in taking a problem bear should contact the DNR wildlife manager (mndnr.gov/areas/wildlife) for their area(s) of interest to be added to a hunter contact list for any opportunities that might arise.

Complete instructions about how to apply for a bear hunting license, maps of permit areas and a listing of permit availability for each area are available on the Minnesota DNR website (mndnr.gov/hunting/bear).

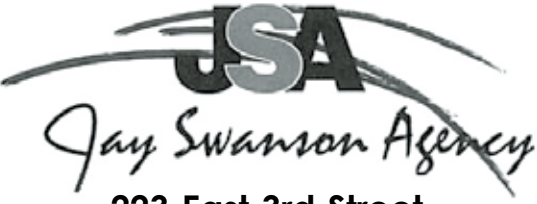

Only in Minnesota: a weekly feature in the Eagle

Most iconic view in Minnesota is also a stunning slice of history

There are few views in Minnesota that are as iconic as those of - or from - Split Rock Lighthouse on the North Shore of Lake Superior. It's not only a sight that generations of Minnesotans would instantly recognize, it's also an important piece of history in Minnesota - as well as that of the United States Coast Guard and Great Lakes shipping. It's safe to say it's probably the most iconic view in Minnesota.

Split Rock Lighthouse is located on the gorgeous North Shore of Lake Superior be-

tween Gooseberry Falls State Park and the village of Beaver Bay. The lighthouse, museum, and grounds are managed by the Minnesota Historical Society and surrounded by the 2,200 acres of Split Rock Lighthouse State Park.

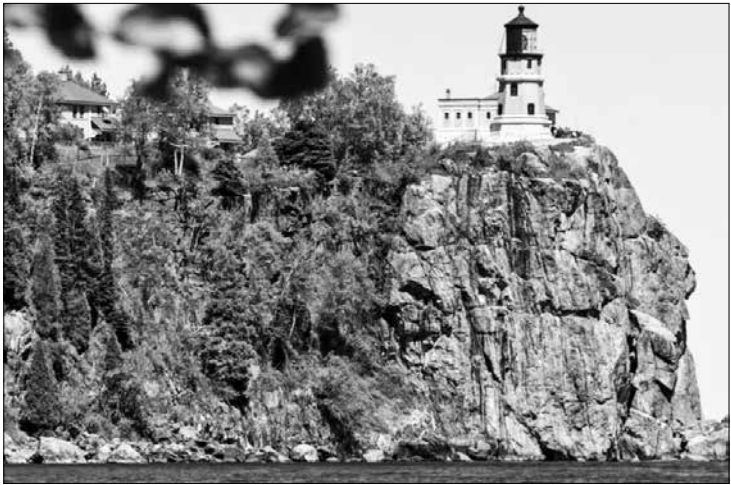
Split Rock is famous for being one of the most photographed and most visited lighthouses in the United States. Not only is it beautiful, but Split Rock Lighthouse is also historic. Congress appropriated funds to build it after a 1905 storm damaged 29 ships on Lake Superior. It was completed and began operating in 1910.

Lighthouse keepers and other Coast Guard personnel were stationed at Split Rock over the next 59 years, operating the powerful beacon to warn ships away from the rocky shallows near the headland. It was decommissioned in 1969 as technology decreased the need for manned lighthouse stations.

Today, it stands as an elegant symbol of respect for the Big Lake's power and a reminder about the importance of Great Lakes shipping for Minnesota.

There are few other sights in Minnesota that are both immediately recognizable and historically significant in the same

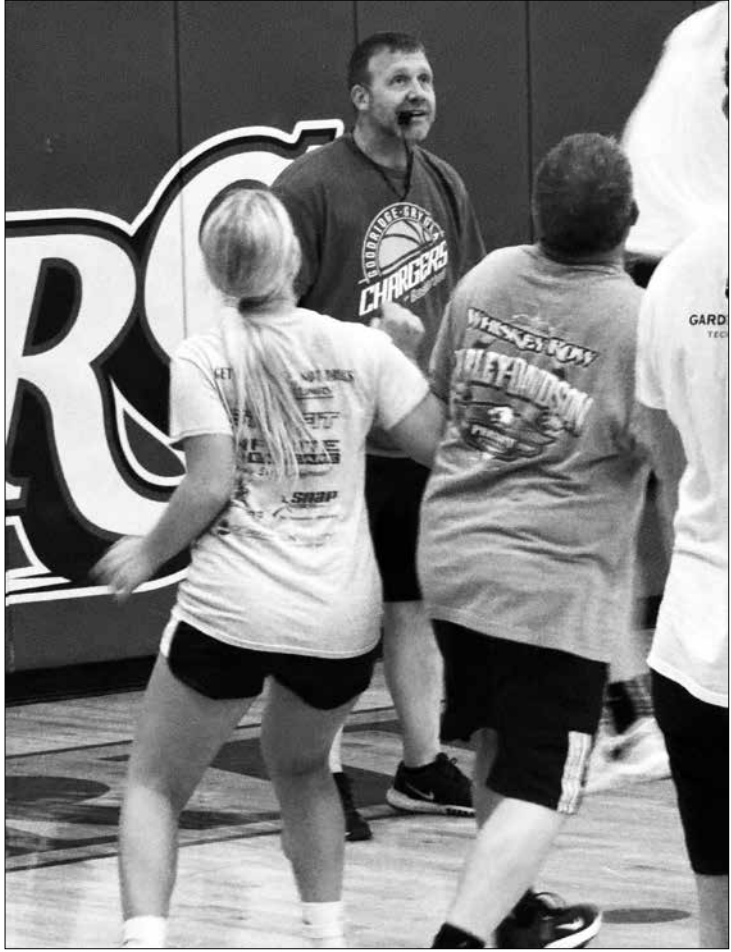
way that Split Rock Lighthouse is. For information on visiting Split Rock Lighthouse, including hours and ticket information, visit its page on the Minnesota Historical Society website. If you find Split Rock to be particularly inspiring, you may want to indulge your fascination and lean into the lighthouse theme with a stay at the charming North Shore Lighthouse Suites in Duluth. This vacation rental makes an excellent base camp for staging your North Shore adventures - plus it has a lighthouse.

Ranch Oyster Crackers

Ingredients:

- 1 (12 oz) bag oyster crackers
- 1 oz packet ranch dressing

mix

- ½ tsp garlic powder
- ½ tsp dried dill (optional)
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil (or melted butter for a richer flavor)

Instructions:

Preheat oven to 250°F (optional if you want them extra

crispy).

In a large bowl, whisk together oil, ranch mix, garlic powder and dill.

Add oyster crackers and toss until evenly coated.

Spread crackers on a baking sheet in a single layer.

Bake for 15-20 minutes, stirring halfway through. Let cool completely.

Tip: Store in an airtight container. Great for parties, snacking, or topping soups!

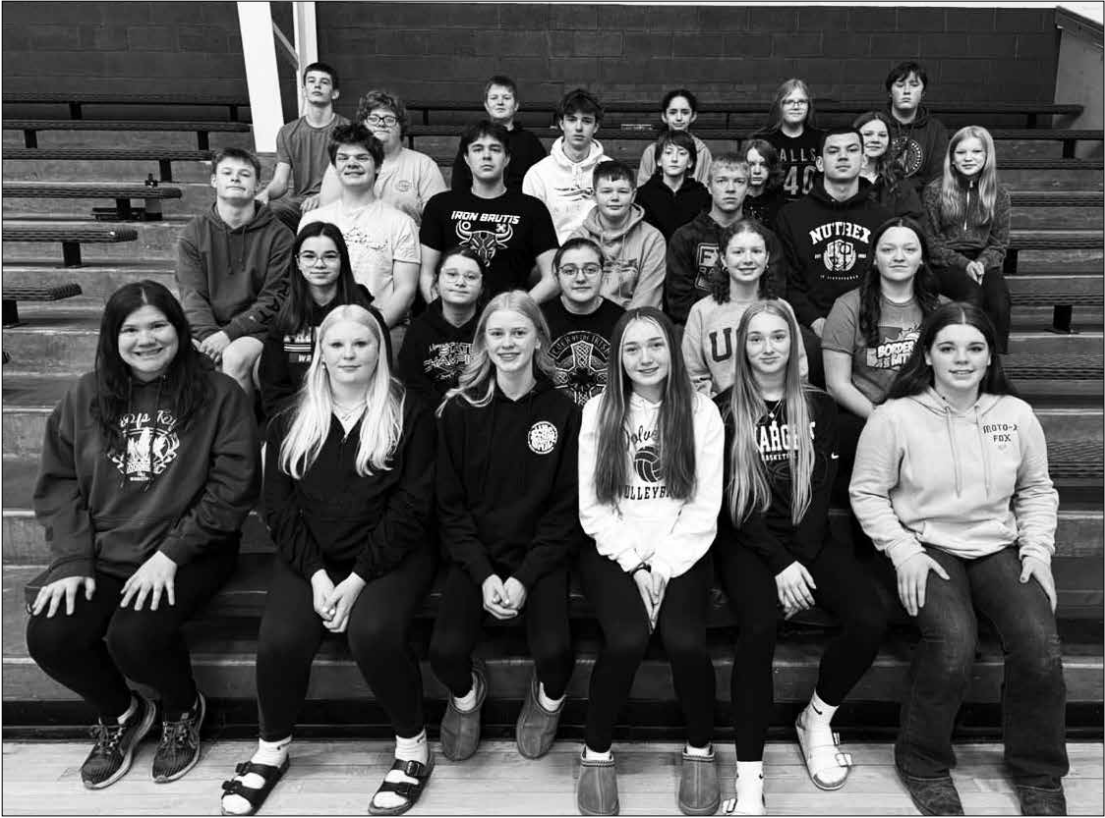
