Voting on bond issue coming up November 7

Meetings are being held to inform the public about the bond issue that Clearbrook-Gonvick School board has set for the November 7, 2023, Voters will be asked to approve the amount not to exceed \$28,370,000 for the school district.

The first meeting was held in Clearbrook and future meetings will be held October 3rd at the Gonvick Community Center and October 17th at the Leonard Township Building.

At the meeting in Clearbrook last week top priorities identified by the Community-led Task Force:

Health, Safety and Security
Remodel main entrance to address safety and security.

Addition of several single-user toilets for students and staff.

Addition of secure changing rooms for officials and coaching staff.

Designated changing areas for visiting teams.

Expand cafeteria to move lunch tables out of the hallway corridor.

Addition of a second cross corridor to reduce congestion during passing time.

The voting question

Shall the school board of Independent School District No. 2311 (Clearbrook-Gonvick Public School) be authorized to issue its general obligation school building bonds in an amount not to exceed \$28,370,000 to provide funds for the acquisition and betterment of school sites and facilities, including the construction and equipping of a new 2-station gymnasium with storage; remodeling and upgrades to convert the existing small gymnasium and fitness room into a multipurpose room, new fitness room, team room

and visiting team locker room; the renovation and remodeling of media center classrooms and small group spaces; the construction and equipping of additional special education classrooms; the remodeling of early childhood special education spaces; the installation of a new roof and exterior doors; the construction of a secure entry to the office area; renovations, remodeling and upgrades to restrooms at the school site and facility; and the acquisition of furniture, fixtures and equipment?

BY VOTING "YES" ON THIS BALLOT QUESTION, YOU ARE VOTING FOR A PROPERTY TAX INCREASE.

All voting for the school district will be done at a combined polling place at the City of Clearbrook, City Hall at 200 Elm Street in Clearbrook.

The Clearbrook-Gonvick School board met in regular session on Monday, September 18. Community comments were given by Yolanda Dahlke who is the co-chair of the District' American Indian Education Parent Advisory Committee. She asked for information on the balance of their funds. She would like a comparison from past years as well as what funding has been spent on their para's for the students.

Mr. Bettin gave a back to school review of activities for the beginning of the year. Homecoming Week has been set for October 2 through the 6. Coronation will be on Monday October 2 at 2:30 in the afternoon. The Homecoming parade will be held October 6 in Gonvick this year.

Principals report

Josh Tharaldson stated that both the Elementary Entrance Conferences and High school Open House went well and he had heard positive feedback from families and staff.

Elementary teachers are screening their classes to get baseline data on their students in reading and math Students will again be screened during winter and spring.

He has submitted Title I, Title II and Title IV grant applications and is waiting back to hear from the state if any revisions have to be made.

Students and staff are encouraged to participate in school spirit events event by wearing "Bear Wear" or school color clothing on Fridays. A treat is given to the winners.

The school has one foreign exchange student with Eliana Rojas. She started last spring and will be in the district

through the semester.

October 11 will be parent teacher conferences from 2:30 to 7:00 p.m.

Superintendent report

Ryan Grow have his report that the district is still looking for an assistant Boys Basketball coach and a Junior High Coach along with a full time custodian.

With the enrollment increase there is also need for special education help extra para professionals will be needed.

The legislative change that affects school resource officers to be removed from the school was to have made an impact on Andy Anderson who has been (SRO) at that position for the district. That program will be continued through the county.

Trap Shooting will continued at the school under the direction of Amy.

The school car project was sold through the on line auction for \$14,500. Those funds will be put in the general fund. The Industrial Arts teacher does not have a background to do that project along with his other duties.

Bob Pond was in to replace the cement that had started to chip and flak. Enrollment is up from 512 last May to 518 the start of the school year. There are 10 inactive families that have not responded.

Transportation Committee has a new form for discipline that bus drivers can turn into the office about students behavior on the bus.

Tabled was the approval of the Contract with Nerdly Customs for Onsite Helpdesk Support.

The consent calendar was approved with \$560,548.39 in Total Non-payroll and \$186,686.44 in payroll for a total of \$747,234.83. Total cash and investments for the district were \$5,383,638.07. Some payments were made to Stein's Bus Service LLC \$53,033.75; Garden Valley Telephone Co. \$40,168.09; Eide Bailly \$27,990.00; Knutson, Flynn & Deans \$12,660.09; Rogers Two Way Radio \$6,303.00; Clearwater-Polk Electric \$4,167.58; Bessler Electric \$2,490.44; Clearwater County Treasurer \$2,415.99; Bemidi Bus Line \$2,400.00; Techers On Call \$2,274.43, Listrom Disposal \$1,755.00; Garden Valley Telephone Company \$1,126.37.

Clearwater County receives clean audit report

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on September 19 with all members present. The meeting started with the Pledge of Allegiance, review and approval of the agenda, and review and approval of the minutes from the last meeting.

Kathryn Lorschbach, County Attorney, gave a brief update to the commissioners. The new assistant County Attorney will be starting in October and Lorschbach is getting an office space set up for him. Lorschbach also stated that her office had renewed the Westlaw computer platform that they use.

Sheriff Darin Halverson reported that the Emergency Management coordinator has resigned and needs to be filled. The county is required to have someone in the position, but it is not required that the person reports to the Sheriff. Halverson then presented some grant paperwork that will generate reimbursement for funds used in 2021. Commissioner Stuart Dukek made a motion to authorize the Board Chair and Sheriff to sign the 2021 Emergency Management Performance Grant in the amount of \$15,634.00. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Mark Titera and passed.

Representatives of the accounting firm Hoffman, Philipp & Martell PLLC presented the annual audit to the board. Overall, the county has no debt and the accountants stated that the finances are well managed. The county received a clean audit, which means that there were no major corrections to be made to the financial statements. The only area of concern was the outstanding collections that are still being worked on by the County Nursing Service.

Auditor/Treasurer Allen

Paulson was next to address the board. Paulson submitted invoices totaling \$59,428.16 that need to be paid from the County Revenue Fund and \$12,232.87 from the Public Health Fund. Commissioner Dean Newland made a motion to authorize the Auditor to pay the submitted invoices, seconded by Commissioner Mark Larson, motion passed.

Stuart Lien, Director of Information Technology submitted a request to purchase a eGoldfax Cloud Faxing Solution for \$1,980.00 from Marco Technologies. This would save the county about \$5,000.00 per year by replacing the current setup. Commissioner Titera made the motion to authorize the purchase and was seconded

by Commissioner Dukek. Motion carried.

Lien shared some information about policy revisions to be made in the employee handbook regarding IT related subjects. Commissioner Dukek made a motion to approve the Acceptable Use Policy for County Computer Systems effective September 12, 2023. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Larson and was passed unanimously.

There being no further items on the agenda, the meeting was adjourned

Soybean tentiform leafminer in northwest Minnesota soybean

A survey trip a couple of weeks ago of soybean fields in Red Lake, Pennington, Marshall, Roseau and Kittson Counties found the soybean tentiform leafminer (STL), a pest that until recently was only known to feed on two native plants in the same plant family as soybean, American hog peanut and slickseed fuzzybean. The survey trip focused on examining soybeans growing near trees as it is thought that this may be where STL survives the winter.

While STL was found in Crookston at the Northwest Research & Outreach Center several weeks ago, during last week's survey, mines of STL (Figure 1) were found not in soybeans growing near trees in field windbreaks or shelter belts, but rather only in two soybean fields that were immediately (within 5 feet or less) adjacent to larger

Bob Koch's research team is still working to determine whether yield losses are associated with the current levels of infestation. The team is also working to determine the geographic range of this pest throughout the soybean growing regions of the state and investigating whether insecticide treatment or other management techniques are warranted or effective.

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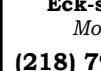

September is national suicide prevention month and I want to again take time to write about this topic to bring awareness and understanding. I have written previously about this and want to continue to shed light upon this difficult topic. This is a tough topic to talk about and many feel very uncomfortable, but I want to bring awareness to this subject and let others know there are options for help and what signs people can look for that could indicate thoughts of suicide.

Annually, over 40,000 people take their own life nationally through suicide. This leaves many family and other loved ones at a loss as to why it happened. Suicide does not discriminate between age, gender, ethnicity or social status. Almost everyone has been affected by suicide as they have been directly impacted or simply knew someone who chose to end their life. Family

and friends struggle with how to cope with the aftermath as suicide is often looked upon as being highly taboo and there is shame or embarrassment associated with it. We need to get past this mentality and realize that it is an illness and needs to be treated as such. Approximately 50% of people who commit suicide have a known mental health condition.

There are other factors that can lead to suicide as well. Sometimes, a recent tragedy or loss or a serious chronic medical condition can start someone thinking about suicide. A family history of suicide or a history of trauma or abuse can also put people at a higher risk. People often feel worthless or alone and think they have no other viable option then to take their own life. More women attempt suicide then men, however, four times as many men are successful in their attempt. People under the age

of 24 and those over 65 pose a higher risk as compared to other age groups. Access to firearms combined with substance abuse or intoxication put people at an extremely high risk.

Here is where people can help. If someone is thinking of suicide, there may be warning signs to look for. People will sometimes verbally express not wanting to be here anymore or talking about how their life is not worth living. You may dismiss those comments as just talk, but this is a major flag that something is going on. Some people may begin to act out in an aggressive manner or start to withdraw from friends and family. They may not want to do things that they have done in the past. Their moods may shift from happy to sad for no apparent reason. Some people may begin to consume alcohol or experiment with drugs or increase their use if they are already using. If someone starts to say goodbye to friends and family and appear to be getting their affairs in order may be a sign that they are in the final stages of planning their suicide. If you see any of these signs, try to talk to the person and encourage them to seek medical care.

There are other steps you can take to prevent suicide. Remove guns, knives or pills that a person may have in their possession or has access to. Do not argue or debate with them about whether or not suicide is right or wrong. Let the person know that you are there to listen and support them. Encourage them to seek

professional help and be honest about their thoughts and plans. Being open and honest is the only way to get the help you need. If someone does not want to get help, they won't. Medical professionals are at the mercy of the individual to tell them their thoughts and feelings.

If you are having thoughts of suicide, I encourage you to talk to someone you trust. If you are not comfortable with talking to a professional, start out with a family member, friend or co-worker. Get the process of talking started. There are other options you can take as well such as calling the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline at 1-800-273-8255 or text "MN" to 741741. You can also dial or text the number 988 that will get you in touch with a trained counselor. One of these options will get you in contact with a professional who will talk to you and help you through your situation. Lastly, you can always call 911 if you or someone you are with is desperate and immediate intervention is required. Appropriate personnel will respond and provide assistance.

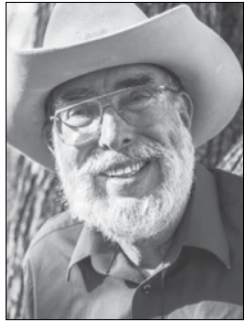
