dumpsters. It was noted that some residents are unhappy with the dumpsters and hope to see them removed. It was also noted that local bears frequent the dumpsters though it has been a while since that has been an issue. Environmental Administrator Daniel Hecht stated the dump sites within townships can be moved, though the township will need to seek approval and help in finding a new location. Hecht also stated the alter-

native, not having a dumpster in the township, is not a pretty alternative. Some surrounding counties face a similar issue and do not have township dump sites, meaning residents must travel to dispose of their trash, an inconvenience. No official action was taken from this discussion as it was a spur-of-the-moment discussion. The next Clearwater County Commissioner meeting will be held on Tuesday, July 30, at 10 a.m. in the county courthouse in Bagley.

FROM PANTRY TO TABLE By Susan Anderson

We love muffins in our house. I often make them and put them in the freezer when I really want something light for breakfast. Strawberry muffins are one of my favorites -that is next to blueberry muffins. The recipe below is for delicious strawberry muffins. 2 cups all-purpose flour 2 t. baking powder 3/4 t. salt 1/2 cup unsalted butter, softened 1 cup granulated sugar 2 large eggs 1 and 1/2 t. vanilla 1/4 t. almond extract 1/2 cup milk

2 and 1/4 cups diced strawberries 2 t. turbinado sugar (raw sugar) Preheat oven to 375* and put oven rack in the middle position. Line regular muffin tins with paper. In medium bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder and salt. In bowl of electric mixer, beat butter and sugar until fluffy. Beat in eggs then add the vanilla and almond extracts. Gradually add in the flour mixture alternating with the milk. Batter will be thick. Stir in the berries by hand. Fill the muffin cups 2/3 full. Sprinkle the turbinado sugar on top of the muffins. Bake 30 minutes or until golden brown. Cool on rack. You can also substitute the same amount of blueberries for the strawberries. These freeze well! Until next time, blessings to you and your family.

Steep Drop in Donations Causes Emergency Blood Shortage

Our community is facing an emergency shortage of type O blood after Vitalant experienced a 30% blood donation shortfall during the Fourth of July Holiday week. This shortfall was likely affected by recent extreme heat and summer vacations, which kept donors away. In fact, the supply of type O blood—the most needed blood type—has recently dropped to an 18-month low. Vitalant is calling on all donors, especially those with type O blood, to make an appointment now to give in the coming days and weeks. They are usually in Gonvick in January and June and Clearbrook in April and September. Coming up in the area within the next month or so we have the below drives. “Read to The Dog”

On Wednesday, July 31st, Merry and her “certified therapy” dog, 9 year old Freya the Golden Retriever, will be a the Bagley Public Library as part of the final Summer Learning Experience program, starting at 10:00 am.

Kids will be able to “paint rocks” and “read to the dog”. Kids will start with painting rocks while others read to the Freya, then switch around. Freya will stay around after the rock painting so kids in attendance have a chance to read, or visit.

Young readers love reading to a dog, even when they have a dog at home. And Freya loves to listen to all kinds of books! The kids, especially those who struggle with reading, seem to be able to ignore the adult handler, who only intercedes to assist with pronunciation when the child asks, or wants help.

Reading and comprehension are so important in the lives of our children. Freya and Merry hope to make reading fun and exciting for kids. Merry herself loves reading, dogs, libraries and helping children read!

Merry has had Freya since July, 2018. This is her third therapy dog. Merry has had “therapy dogs” for about 20+ years in Neehah, WI. Previous therapy dogs were Rainy(1st Golden Retriever), Pippin(Corgi), and now Freya. Merry has an Australian Shepherd named Jinx, “he’s a good dog. But doesn’t have a therapy personality!” Oh those Auzzies!

Merry shared when they got Rainy (age 2) that there was something special about her love for people and felt everyone who met “her” MUST want to pet her. Merry knew Rainy would be a perfect therapy dog. After passing the evaluation and certification process, the two regularly visited nursing homes and the local library in Neehah.

It wasn’t long after that

when Merry was introduced to an elementary school special education teacher who thought a “listening dog” might be perfect for her student who were struggling with learning how to read. Well, it worked! The rest is history. Merry and her dogs continued visiting that teachers classroom once a week for many years. The pair also visited other schools and the occasional nursing home. .

Note: Therapy dogs are not service dogs. Freya and Merry are certified through the Alliance of Therapy Dogs (ATD), an organization that evaluates and certifies dogs and their handlers, who then are able to volunteer in the United States and Canada.

ATD certification means that Freya and Merry were observed at least twice at “work”. Merry passed a background check through the organization; and Freya must have an annual check-up by a veterinarian and be up-to-date with her rabies vaccination. The organization also carries insurance for ATD members.

Merry and her husband now live on Clearwater Lake, MN. Merry is hoping that she and Freya will be able to become regular reading helpers!

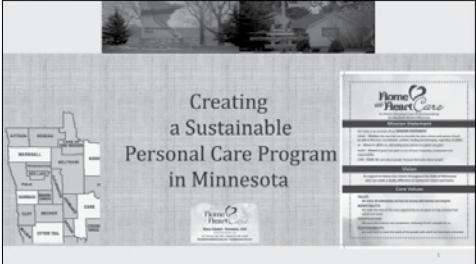

St. Paul, MN – The University of Minnesota Onsite Sewage Treatment Program will offer a free training opportunity on 'Being Septic Smart' in September to celebrate SepticSmart Week (September 16-20, 2024).

An online webinar will be held on Tuesday, September 17, from 7 to 9 p.m. The 'Being Septic Smart' webinar teaches property owners the basics about how their septic systems work, including how to care for and maintain a septic system so it can function during or beyond its design lifetime.

Sara Heger, researcher and instructor in the Onsite Sewage Treatment Program for the Water Resources Center, said "Attendees will leave this class learning something NEW about how their septic system works or how to properly use and maintain it".

Septic systems are designed to last 20-30 years but can last longer depending on use, care, and maintenance. Being Septic Smart provides information that enables property owners to maximize their septic investment so their system can function during and beyond its design lifetime, with information that includes:

- How a septic system works
- The purpose of the septic tank and drain field or mound
- How a properly operating septic system protects ground and surface water
- How often the septic tank should be pumped
- Whether additives are a good idea
- How to prevent winter freeze-ups, and much more

The Onsite Sewage Treatment Program provides education and technical assistance to homeowners, small communities, onsite professionals, and local units of government regarding onsite wastewater treatment. The Water Resources Center is a unit of the College of Food, Agricultural, and Natural Resource Sciences and the University of Minnesota Extension.

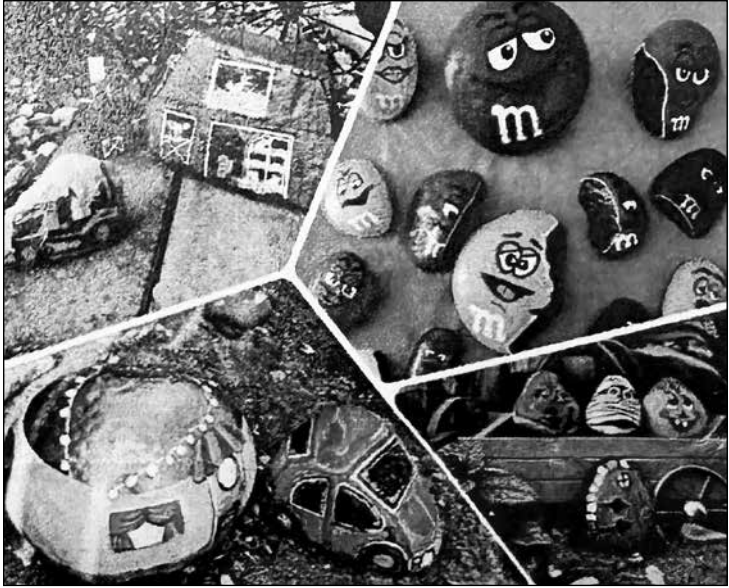

Thoughts from the Sheriff

Clearwater County Sheriff Darin Halverson

It is hard to believe, but at the end of this month the annual Clearwater County Fair is set to start. This year's fair runs from July 31- August 4. As in other years, I would like to take time this month to give some safety reminders for everyone that plans on attending our fair.
The first piece of advice I have is to not over stretch yourself when it comes to bringing young children to the fair. It is difficult at times to watch two or three children, but if you have a larger group, it becomes nearly impossible for you to keep track of all of them, especially if you are alone. Every year at the fair we get reports of lost children. This can be very stressful for the adults, but can be more traumatizing for the young child once they realize they cannot find their parent or other trusted adult. The first thing you should do is talk with your little ones about staying in one spot if they become separated from you. Secondly, take a picture of any young children you have with you when you arrive at the fair. In the event that one goes missing, it will help law enforcement, or others, know who to look for. There are so many young children at the fair that it is difficult to locate any one child, and even harder if you don't really know who you are looking for. At a minimum, have a good description of what they are wearing as that can be helpful in finding them. Lastly, if a child becomes missing, either call law enforcement or go to the fair office to report it right away.

Be sure to have a meeting place for you and your family if you have older children and they are left to enjoy the fair with their friends. Having a meeting place is a great idea and can be very important in the case of bad weather. If a strong storm develops and we have to evacuate the midway, having a meeting place picked out ahead of time will help in accounting for all your family/friends and avoid the unnecessary time delay it may take to find everyone. Sometimes, severe weather can develop quickly and if you are not paying attention, it can be on top of you before you know it. In addition to personal safety reminders, remember to keep your vehicle locked and valuables out of sight. With the amount of people that come to the fair, there are always some who are there for illegal intentions. If your

vehicle is unlocked it is easy for someone to quickly gain access inside. If you have anything of value laying around, it will most likely go missing. There are also those that are looking for transportation and if you have left your keys inside, your car may go missing.
It is just as important to be careful with personal belongings that you have on your person, such as cell phones, purses or wallets. Be sure not to leave them laying in a stroller or on a counter if you are eating or playing a game. It only takes a split second for someone to grab that item and walk off with it. Keep your valuables secure and out of sight.
One last reminder is pay attention to where you are parking. It is illegal to park within a crosswalk, within 20 feet of a crosswalk at an intersection and within 30 feet from a stop sign. In addition, you cannot park in front of a driveway or within 10 feet of a fire hydrant. Parking complaints are one of the major calls for service during the fair. People will park just about anywhere. If you are obstructing any flow of traffic, you probably should reconsider where you are parked and move to a different location. Also, be considerate to handicapped drivers. The fair posts areas for handicapped people to park, however, there are people who will even park in those places just to get a good parking space. Remember to be considerate and use common sense so everyone can have a safe and enjoyable fair.
I hope you're having a great summer and I hope to see many of you at this year's fair. We will have our Emergency Management Mobile Command bus parked near the hockey arena again this year. Please stop by and say "Hi" and get some of your law enforcement questions answered and take a tour of the bus. We look forward to seeing you.
